GARFIELD GRANGE ENTERTAINS POMONA

CHICKEN DINNER IS FEATURE OF ENTERTAINMENT FOR COMMUNITY GUESTS

Garfield Grange entertained the Pomona Grange Wednesday of this week, there being a large attendance from the different grange organizations of the county. Nineteen different locals were represented.

One of the features of the day was the fine chicken dinner served by the ladies of Garfield. They also served supper in the evening and a banquet at night at the completion of the session.

Among the different matters of business of the grange taken up was the plan presented to the legislature by Hector McPherson of Linn county to consolidate the different state commissions. There are 57 commissions operating in the state, which by the McPherson plan would be reduced to 10. The grange unanimously endorsed the consolidation plan.

Endorsement of the grangers' business club was also given. The object of the club is to finance the undertakings of the grange and to boost and foster co-operation within the organization.

There were 250 present and a class of thirty were initiated into the pomona grange. Very impressive memorial services were held, conducted by Mrs. Minnie Esch, pomona chaplain.

Percy Canfield of the Bank of Oregon City and Lew Henderson reported the result of the grange and business men's conferences which have been held since the last Pomona grange session. The next conference will be held at Oswego on April 27.

ESTACADA SCOUTS RATED AT 100 PER CENT

FEW SCOUT TROOPS IN STATE CAN EQUAL STANDARD SET BY LOCAL BOYS

SOLDIERS TAKE OPENING GAME BY A SCORE OF 4-2 IN FINE EXHIBITION

Estacada lost the first league ball game Sunday to the soldiers from Vancouver Barracks, in a close contest Sunday afternoon. The local team out hit and out played the visitors throughout the game, but was unable to get hits at the time they would have meant runs.

Reibuhf, southpaw pitcher for the Legion nine, pitched good ball up to the fifth inning when a couple of hits and as many errors got him into a hole. He was relieved by Jude Moreland who finished the game for the Legionnaires.

The soldiers were held scoreless in all of the nine innings except the fatal fourth, when they made their four tallies.

The attendance was said to be the largest ever seen at a ball game in Estacada. The crowd was estimated at more than four hundred. The number of tickets sold was 305. In the crowd was seen a large number of fans from Sandy and Boring district.

Jacob Moss won the \$5 cash prize for the nearest guess on number of tickets sold, and Howard Fifer won the second prize, a season ticket.

Tony Bronson won the Model Supply company prize for the first stolen base. Eddy Smith made the first error in the game and was awarded the \$1 prize given by the Sanek Barber shop.

Raymond Lovelace won a shirt that he himself had put up as a prize to the man making the first run. The Broadway Garage prize is still to be won, 5 gallons of gas for the first home run. Arnold Lovelace won the U-Need-A Bakery prize and Kenneth Scales the prize offered by the People's store. Arnold Lovelace also won the Liberty Theatre prize and three men tied for the prize offered by the Estacada Meat company.
