## CLEAN-UP WEEK SET FOR MAY 21 TO 26

### MAYOR PROCLAIMS WEEK FOR REMOVAL OF RUBBAGE AND BEAUTIFYING CITY

The week of May 21 to 26, inclusive has been set aside by the mayor and city council as Clean-up Week, and everyone is expected to clean up and beautify their premises during this period.

The campaign is under the supervision of a committee of the council and those who fail to comply will be reminded by other means than a request, according to one of the city officials.

All refuse such as cans, broken glass and the like, must be put in boxes or sacks that it may be easily handled and placed where it can be reached by a truck. A small fee to pay the expenses will be collected for hauling.

The Garden club has interested themselves in the clean-up campaign and there has been a general demand for a good cleanup of the city, and it is expected that a good job will be done.

The council recently purchased a site to be used as a city dump and now that there is a means of disposing of the accumulations of the last year of junk, the people of Estacada will welcome a chance to get rid of the undesirable, and at the same time make the community more sanitary as well as improve the appearance.

## ESTACADA LOSES CLOSE CONTEST TO OSWEGO

### LOCAL TEAM OUTPLAYS LAKE NINE ALL THE TIME BUT LOSES ON FLUKES.

Estacada was one run behind in the ninth inning, two outs and Ray Lovelace at bat. He hit a two bagger and brought in a run, tying the score. Bill Fischer was up next and he singled and Miller and Lovelace came in, giving Estacada a two-run lead at the close of the first half of the ninth. Everyone believed the game was over.

The last half of the ninth spoiled the game. Calkins, first Oswego batter, hit a hard one to Eddie Schmitz and was out at first. Chief Manning hit out to Tony Bronson and was out. Brooks hit a bad one to Eddie at short, who failed to connect in time to make the out. Sundeleaf got a long two-base hit and when Gebhardt made first base on an error the score was tied, with a man on second. Roberts came up to bat when the runner started to steal third. Moreland threw the ball to Sid Miller which should have been an easy out, but Sid failed to get it and the winning score came in for Oswego.

An attempted steal under the circumstances was acclaimed to be one of the most foolish things ever known in baseball, and was such a complete departure from the expected, that they got away with it and it cost Estacada the game.

Sid Miller starred for Estacada throughout the game, making four hits, two singles and two doubles, and the other time at bat he hit and the ball was fumbled and Miller scored making three runs in all.

Eddie Schmitz had more chances in the game than any one man, and handled them like a major, only to lose one in the last, and the game.

Jude Moreland pitched a wonderful game, allowing but four hits in seven and one-third innings, having relieved Riebhoff in the second after four runs had been made, and yet he might have saved the day if he had held the throw to third in the ninth.

Tom Seales, after the game, said he thought he was responsible for losing the game. Arnold Lovelace said he was responsible for the loss of the game. Two or three other players wanted to take the blame. (Continued on page 3)

### LOT SALE STARTS IN ESTACADA LAKE PROPERTY

Promotion of Estacada Lake summer homesites property is by a Portland newspaper, it was learned Wednesday, when lots were first offered for sale. Within a few hours after the announcement was made a large number of lots had already been sold.

The property between the townsite of Estacada over to the driveway paralleling the river the property has but divided into lots, but nothing is to be sold from the driveway to the water front and those purchasing lots will be given a right to the water front, and also to the club house.

No concessions of any kind will be permitted in the Estacada Lake property, the Telegram states, as it is only a five minutes walk from town.

There are approximately seven hundred and fifty lots in the property now on the market, and one of the salesmen predicted that they would all be sold within a week.

Included in the purchase of the property was a large tract on the opposite side of the river. While no definite statement has been made it is expected that the development of this property will begin within a short time.
