BERRY GROWERS' CARAVAN PAYS SANDY A VISIT

The berry growers' caravan starting at Gresham and numbering 40 at Sandy, joined the Sandy grange in a potluck dinner Saturday. The county agent of Multnomah county Mr. Hall of Gresham, presided at the luncheon. The berry situation was given by Mr. Hall, D. E. Towle, and H. B. Davis, and Felix Chiodo also a grower charmed the crowd with his accordion. The caravan enjoyed the hospitality of the grange as well as the hot coffee. They went to Boring and Damascus later.

Mr. Hall said \$1,000,000 was distributed to the berry growers of Eastern Multnomah and this section last year, and that within a few years that amount should be doubled, and predicted a continuous berry field would eventually be planted from Dover to Gresham.

Mr. Davis urged having the county agent examine your soil, that on their way to Sandy they had seen crops not adapted to the soil, hence failures. The one field would go 400 tons, the one adjoining, perhaps one ton.

Mr. Towle said he sees no reason why all berries should not be harvested this season, that the weevil menace and neglected cultivation will offset over-planting.
