## DON RYAN WINS FROM GUY PACE IN CLOSE RACE

POPE NOMINATED AS ASSESSOR. RANDALL FOR SHERIFF; MILLER EASILY WINS.

Donald J. Ryan was chosen as the republican nominee for county clerk in Friday's election, over Guy Pace, by a majority of 187 votes. Pace ran ahead in the western end of the county and not until the returns were in from Eastern Clackamas did it look as if Ryan had a chance.

Ryan polled a total of 3044 votes to 2857 for Pace. The vote on representatives to the legislature was: Cherrick 3362, Chindgren 3953, Clark 3874 and Sievers 4357, the three latter being nominated.

Frank Andrews for joint representative was nominated carrying this county by almost one thousand majority. North received almost an even break with Andrews in Multnomah county.

Fred A. Miller for district attorney received a vote of 2897, to 1342 for Lindas and 1749 for Stipp.

The count for commissioner was: Wright 2130, T. A. Roots, 1282, H. Gibson 581, Mattoon 716 and W. H. Kanne 1106.

For sheriff George Randall received 2805 votes to 1499 for P. T. Shelley, and 952 for Smith. E. T. Mass won the democratic nomination very easily, defeating Dunton by about 8 to 1.

E. L. Pope was nominated for assessor with 2099 votes. W. B. Stokes polled 1643, Douglas Johnson 1077 and A. C. Newell 932.

R. M. Holman won the nomination for coroner with 2744 votes; Greaves had 1365 and Welsh 1489.

Circuit Judge J. U. Campbell had 5370, School Superintendent Vedder 5604, Surveyor Meldrum 4807, and Recorder Hackett 5040. They had no opposition.

Hal Hoss was nominated for the office of secretary of state, going over by a majority of about ten thousand votes. In Clackamas county he received 4256, Corey coming next with 790 and Hadley third with 782.

Sheriff Mass won the democratic nomination with 2235 votes, his opponent, V. H. Dunton, receiving 287.

## THOUSANDS VISIT LAKE OVER THE WEEK END

MORE THAN HALF THE LOTS SOLD IN ESTACADA LAKE DEVELOPMENT.

Estacada and the Estacada Lake development project was visited by thousands of people Saturday and Sunday. More than eight hundred cars entered the park during the day Sunday.

There are 722 lots in the plat of the development made by the Portland Telegram, and a representative of the newspaper stated Monday that at least half the lots were sold, and the balance probably will be sold within a few days if the present rate of sales continues.

Purchasers of lots are given an equal interest in the fine club house and the water front. The front is being improved, floats placed conveniently, and the popularity of the resort is all ready established.

A crew of men are now working on the opposite side of the river laying out streets and grubbing and grading them. Part of the crew employed was laid off Saturday, but in a short time a larger force of men will be employed again, it is reported by some of the representatives of the company.

## ESTACADA LOSES CLOSE CONTEST TO HILLSBORO

Two games in a row have been lost by Estacada, each by an 8-7 score. In Sunday's contest at Hillsboro the score was tied in the seventh inning and remained so until the last of the eleventh when a hit brought in the winning run.

Russell, a new pitcher for Estacada started the game and in the third inning walked three men. A single brought in two runs and a home run brought in three more. Riehoff then went in and pitched 8 and 2-3 innings, allowing but three runs.

The Legionnaires were in fine form Sunday and should have won the contest easily, but the pitching staff was off. A total of ten men were walked, six of whom made scores for their team.

A ball high and wide called a strike on Sid Miller in the first of the eleventh inning ended Estacada's chance to win the game. An error marked up against Kenneth Seales was due to a fly he caught and as he started to throw the ball he threw it behind him and the man was called safe.

A large number of local fans have followed the team the last two games, at least one-third of the crowd at Hillsboro Sunday being Estacada fans.
