Currinsville Girl Wins Prize In Bank Essay Contest

Miss Roberta O'Neil of Currinsville has been awarded first prize in the essay contest sponsored by the First State Bank of Gresham. The judges, Dr. Alfred Thompson, Wm. C. Metzger and Wm. Anderson, made the award, after considerable deliberation.

The subject of the essay was "The Dawn of American Expansion," the title to the picture shown on the First State Bank's 1927 calendar.

Miss O'Neil's teacher expresses great appreciation of having received the calendar and has shown great interest in having her pupils participate in the contest, the president of the bank, A. Meyers, writes.

Here's Miss O'Neil's essay which was awarded the prize:

"The Dawn of American Expansion"

The United States purchased Louisiana on December 20, 1803. It was purchased for \$27,267,622, which includes the incidental two final payments and interest. This land extends from the Gulf of Mexico to the northern line of Minnesota, and from the Mississippi river to the Rocky mountains. The price paid for Louisiana amounted to about 4 cents per acre. Its value to the United States has doubled that amount many times.

Louisiana included approximately 1,000,000 square miles. Most all of Louisiana, Missouri, Iowa, Oklahoma, North and South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana are in this section.

A Spanish official said that the treaty between Spain and the United States had expired and that the Mississippi was closed to American commerce. Spain would be a safe neighbor because she was a feeble, distant power, but France was very dangerous because her power was strong.

The Americans revolted when they heard this unpleasant news. Thomas Jefferson, our president, sent Livingston to ask Talleyrand, Napoleon's minister, if he had made a secret treaty, with Napoleon. Talleyrand lied, saying that he hadn't made any treaty. Jefferson said, "The country that takes New Orleans will be our enemy forever. The day that France takes possession will end her ancient friendship with the United States."

Napoleon forced Spain to cede Louisiana to France. Then he sent an army to Santo Domingo as a base for his operations but his plan failed as most of the men got yellow fever and died.

Jefferson was compelled to act, so he sent James Monroe, minister extraordinary, to France to help the American minister buy New Orleans and the Floridas. The highest bid was ten million dollars. Monroe sailed for Paris in March, 1803, just before Laussat, the French civil administrator, sailed for America.

Bonaparte knew he had to give up the Louisiana territory to be able to go to war with Great Britain.

On June 30, 1803, the news was published that the United States had bought Louisiana territory. A few people made fun of Jefferson because he had bought this land but he didn't care. October 19, the senate ratified this treaty. Spain made an objection to France because she hadn't taken over New Orleans yet. Spain withdrew her flag and troops while France raised her tricolor.

On December 20, 1803, the United States took possession of this land. The different militias were there. At 9 o'clock the keys to New Orleans were handed to Claiborne by Laussat. The guns saluted the flags at noon. The French flag was lowered as the American flag was raised. When they met midway there was a pause, then Laussat took the French flag, and the American emblem floated in the breeze at the top of the flagstaff. There were peoples of all races among the crowd.

J. H. Hintermeister, who was Swiss by birth but American by adoption, was a very good painter. This picture shows the Place d'Armes in New Orleans.

The artist could have drawn many different pictures about the Louisiana purchase but he chose this one because he could show the various types of humanity whose lives and fortunes were affected by the change of government. It was an important day in the history of our country because it marked our freedom.

In this picture there is a girl in pink who has been a widow for two

years, although she is only eighteen. Her uncle, standing beside her with the powdered hair was the first man to carry our flag into the American school room, when he was a teacher in New Orleans. No one knows the man in green next to them as he has just arrived. He met the widow at a ball and two years later they were married.

The winner of the second prize in the contest was David Tillstrom of Gresham. The third prize was won by Elsie Millner also of Gresham.

The subject for next year's essay will be "Money." Particulars concerning the essay will be announced next fall. "Money" is the title of the picture that will appear on the First State Bank's calendar for the year 1929. The calendar has already been purchased with exclusive rights in Multnomah and Clackamas counties.
