uses exceptionally good judgment in handling the games. He also umpired the Oswego-Estacada game.

The management of the Estacada team is trying to strengthen the pitching staff for Sunday's game on the Sherwood grounds. Of the eight games played to date, only one of them should have been lost by the Legionnaires, and that was the game with Sherwood here near the first of the season.

Riebhoff has shown up very promising at times and in other games he has lacked the zip to win. Moreland has worked in three games this season, and has made a fine record in each so far as he has gone, but he admits that he is not yet in condition to be depended upon for a complete session of hard pitching. Russell has worked in only one game, and while he had the stuff, he had too much trouble in finding the plate, and walked too many men.

Estacada without a doubt has one of the best teams in the league, but is lacking in pitching ability. If another good pitcher can be added to the lineup, the result of the second round of games should be far different from the first, the Legionnaires losing four of the seven games played in the first round.

The club had a chance to sign Bliss, who pitched for the bakery Sunday, in the first part of the season, but passed it up, which is much regretted now after he has been seen in a game. There are several prospects in view for the pitching staff, and no doubt one or the other will materialize to strengthen the team before Sunday's contest.

The Legionnaires will depart for Sherwood Sunday morning not later than 11 o'clock, in private cars.

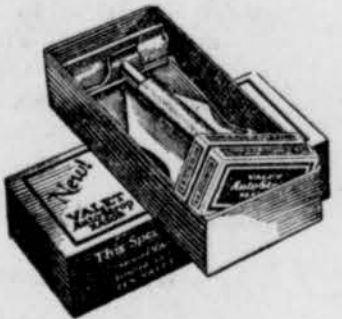
