EVERYTHING GOING FINE FOR BIG CELEBRATION HERE ON JULY FOURTH

Misses Mary Sharnke of Sandy and Evelyn Meyers of Eagle Creek were tied for first place in the voting contest for the selection of a Goddess of Liberty to reign in Estacada on the Fourth. The standing of the different candidates Wednesday night was—Mary Sharnke and Evelyn Meyers, 4,000 votes each; Gertrude Fink, Estacada, 2,225; Ruby Bates, Estacada, 1,950; Gertrude Marshall, Springwater, 1,650; Bessie Huxley, Estacada, 1,500; Lula Kingston, Eagle Creek, 1,000; Ruth Ayers, Garfield, 800; Joan Lundy, Boring, 725; Katherine Beck, Estacada, 575; Lillian Duncan, Estacada, 450; and Helen Aust, Estacada, 275.

The winner of the contest will be given a cash prize of \$75 and will give the honor of reigning in Estacada during the celebration. The two next high will receive a cash prize of \$25 each, and all the girls in the contest will be given places of honor in the celebration ceremony.

Everything in connection with the plans for the big celebration are going forward very satisfactory. Word was received yesterday that the fireworks for the evening had been shipped the 20th and will arrive in due time. The large posters are out and have been distributed throughout the county.
