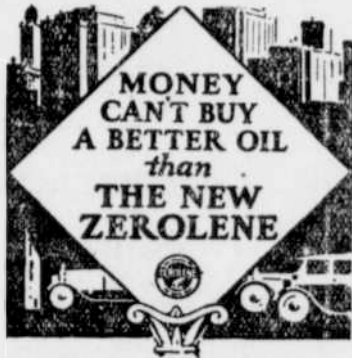
Operate New Bakery

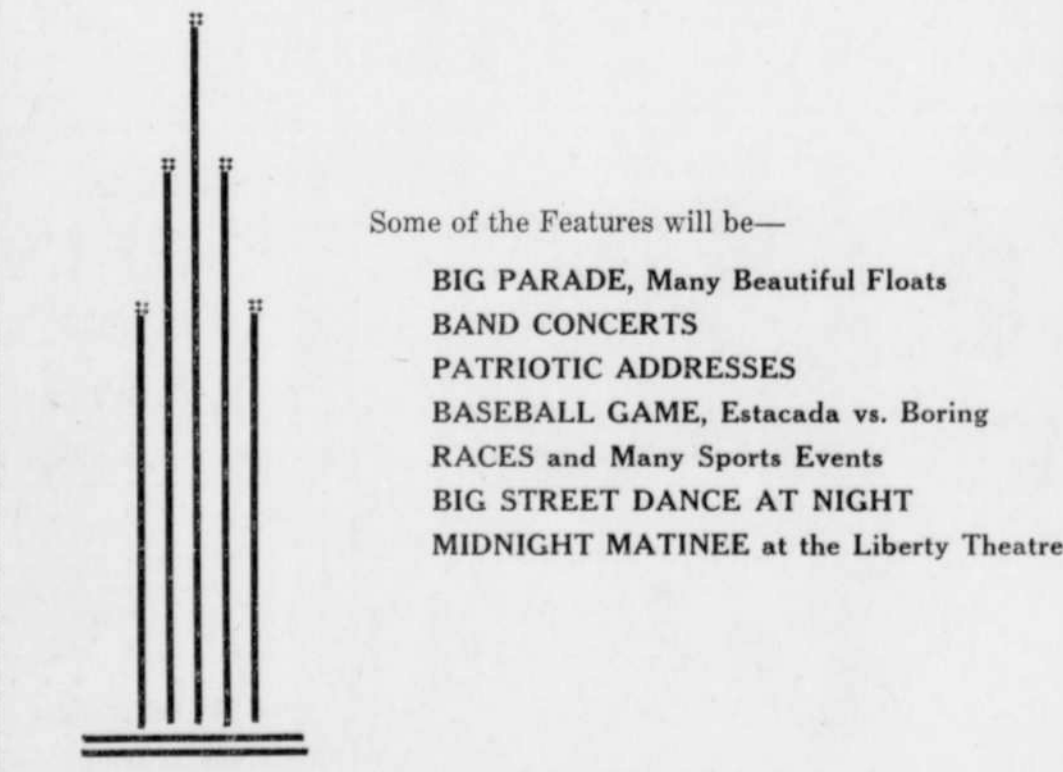
