RAIN INTERFERES WITH CELEBRATION PLANS

MISS FINK CHOSEN AS GODDESS OF LIBERTY; MISS MEYERS IS CLOSE SECOND

Despite the rainy weather the celebration on the Fourth went off as scheduled, with slight variations of the program. The Goddess of Liberty, Miss Fink, was crowned at the band stand in the park, one hour later than planned, the first of the day's program.

The town was filled with cars before the parade got under way and the streets were lined with people along the line of march. There were a number of prettily decorated cars in the parade and a real nice float entered by the U-Need-A Bakery. First prize in the parade went to Mrs. Harry A. LaBarre, and the entry of the American Legion was given second place.

Shiftless Aughto, a vehicle entered by a soap company of Oregon City, was given first prize for the most comical entry, second going to the Broadway Garage.

Following the parade a patriotic program was given at the band stand in the park, B. F. Linds of Oregon City giving a splendid patriotic address.

The ball game at the park, dancing at the Masonic hall, and band concerts during the afternoon entertained the crowds.

The street dance was not held because of the threatening weather, but a dance in the evening was given in the club house in the park, which was well attended.

The program ended with a fireworks display on the hill east of town which was highly enjoyed by those who waited for it. A midnight matinee at the Liberty also entertained a large number of visitors.

Miss Gertrude Fink was chosen as the Goddess of Liberty winning by a small margin over Miss Evelyn Meyers, Miss Gertrude Marshall taking third place and Miss Mary Sharnke fourth. The other candidates for the honor dropped out before the end of the contest.

Estacada entertained a large crowd and had the weather been favorable it is not easy to estimate the number of people who would have been here.

The officers of the band wish to express their appreciation to all those who assisted in making the celebration a success. It was the co-operation received that made the undertaking possible.

LARGE FORCE EMPLOYED IN MT. HOOD FOREST

Ranger A. W. Armstrong of the Forest service now has fifty men out on trails, roads, and in the protection force. A large share of the personnel are local men and many of them are for the first time learning that protection of the National forests is not entirely a summer outing on pay.

The watershed of the South Fork of the Clackamas river from which Oregon City and West Lynn gets its water supply, has been closed by order of the district forester to all use except that this does not prohibit actual settlers from going to and from their homes. All persons are prohibited from being on this area until further notice unless with a permit from the district ranger, A. W. Armstrong. This action was necessary, Mr. Armstrong says, on account of the hazard created by fishermen crossing the area.

A very unusual situation for this season of the year is that foggy weather has interfered with visibility to such an extent that it has been difficult, and in some cases impossible to date, to see far enough from the lookout stations to properly set up and orient the fire-finding instruments.

George Cook of the Garfield district, and an employee of the forest service, has been honored by his selection as a member of the inter-forest flying squadron. The members of this squadron are selected as overhead if large fires occur on any of the three large forests in Washington and Oregon. The squadron was fortunate in having a local man of his capabilities available.

Services to Be Held Regularly

A committee has charge of the services at the M. E. church while Rev. C. T. Cook is absent. Next Sunday morning A. DeMoy will speak. Sunday evening W. W. Dillon, general secretary of the Spokane, Wash., Y. M. C. A., will have charge of the services. Mr. Dillon is much in demand as a speaker in Spokane and surrounding communities.

HILLSBORO CLUB TO PLAY HERE SUNDAY

NEW SCHEDULE DRAWN UP FOR SECOND HALF OF SEASON; FIVE GAMES HERE

The second half of the 1928 baseball season in the Portland Valley League starts Sunday when the Hillsboro club comes to Estacada. The new schedule gives Estacada five of the seven games to play at home. Sellwood has been taken into the league and Estacada will play one game there and one game at Oswego, the rest being played at home.

Oswego won the cup in the first half, Hillsboro taking second place, Sherwood third and Estacada fourth. Oswego was defeated in two games only, by Estacada and Hillsboro. The winner of the second schedule will play off a series with Oswego to determine the champions.

The schedule following was arranged and adopted by the managers of the eight clubs at a meeting held in Portland Monday night:

July 8—Hillsboro at Estacada, Davidson's Bakery at Sellwood, Oswego at Sherwood and Washougal at Vancouver Barracks.

July 15—Davidson's Bakery at Estacada, Vancouver Barracks at Oswego, Sellwood at Hillsboro and Sherwood at Washougal.

July 22—Estacada at Sellwood, Davidson's at Washougal, Vancouver at Sherwood and Hillsboro at Oswego.

July 29—Vancouver Barracks at Estacada, Davidson's Bakery at Oswego, Washougal at Hillsboro, and Sellwood at Sherwood.

August 5—Washougal at Estacada, Davidson's Bakery at Sherwood, Vancouver at Hillsboro and Oswego at Sellwood.

August 12—Estacada at Oswego, Davidson's at Vancouver Barracks, Sherwood at Hillsboro, Sellwood at Washougal.

August 19—Sherwood at Estacada, Davidson's Bakery at Hillsboro, Vancouver Barracks at Sellwood and Washougal at Oswego.

ESTACADA CLUB WINS THREE GAMES IN ROW

OSWEGO DEFEATED BY 9 TO 4 SCORE; BARRACKS LOSE TWO CONTESTS

Estacada Legionnaires have been playing winning baseball during the past week. The double header on the Fourth counted five straight wins for Estacada since losing a game.

The big feature event of the baseball season was the Oswego game on Sunday. Chief Manning, who had pitched twelve games this season, with only one defeat, and who had never been batted out of the box, was "easy" for the Legionnaires, and walked out in the seventh inning after the score stood 8 to 4 against him.

But for an error in the first inning the score would have been 9 to 1 in favor of Estacada.

The games on the Fourth were rather tame, both being very one-sided affairs. The home team beat Vancouver Barracks 9 to 3 in the first contest and 7 to 1 in the second.

Russell started in the box for Estacada, but after an eight run lead had been piled up against the soldiers the manager decided to save him for a hard contest next Sunday and Riebhoff finished the game.

The second battle was easier than the first. Kenneth Scales, pitching for Estacada, allowed but three hits and while he got himself into a hole failure to put the ball over the plate, the result was never in doubt after the first inning. Ray Lovelace was the receiver in this game and starred with the bat, getting the longest home run over center ever seen on this field.

Due to a misunderstanding the Boring team did not come to play their scheduled game. Some of the baseball committee decided to have their game in the morning at 10:30, and Boring was not notified until afternoon on Tuesday. The manager said he was unable to get his men together in time and that he would not play. Word was sent back for them to come on and play according to the schedule, but not until after other arrangements had been made by the Boring manager.
