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## RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF WATER EFFECTIVE

### SUPPLY RUNNING LOW DUE TO HOT WEATHER, THE CITY OFFICIALS REPORT

Effective at once, the following regulations in regard to sprinkling in the city of Estacada will be enforced, according to city officials:

East of Broadway and North of Fifth street, sprinkling is limited to Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings from 6 to 8 o'clock, and Sunday evening 6 to 7.

East of Broadway and South of Fifth street, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings 6 to 8 o'clock and Sunday evening 7 to 8.

West of Broadway and North of Fifth street, Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings 6 to 8, and Sunday morning 6 to 7.

West of Broadway and South of Fifth street, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings 6 to 8 o'clock, and Sunday morning 7 to 8.

In case of fire all faucets must be closed immediately.

No sprinkling will be permitted with open hose. Nozzle or sprinkler must be used.

The water shortage makes it necessary that these regulations be enforced, according to City Recorder Wm. Dale.

## RESIGNS PASTORATE AFTER TWENTY YEARS

### SANDY MINISTER TO LEAVE FOR WISCONSIN;—HOLDS LAST SERVICE SUNDAY

SANDY, July 25.—(Special).—Rev. F. Dobberfuhr, for over twenty years pastor of the Sandy Lutheran church, has resigned to accept a pastorate near Mt. Angel, Wisconsin. Many eyes were tearful at the service Sunday, Rev. Dobberfuhr's last service here.

Beginning on a salary of \$33 per month in 1904, Rev. Dobberfuhr visioned the building of a prosperous church from a mission which started here three years before and which was sometimes attended by only three or four people, stayed with his post 23 years, and at his farewell sermon there were present 128 communicants and a large number of others.

Mr. Dobberfuhr lived in the old Junker hotel the first year, then went back to Wisconsin and returned with a beautiful bride—Miss Eleanor Frenz. A small parsonage was built, the two set up house keeping, worked together, managed, saved and are now the proud parents of nine children two of which are twins, two are in college and one is an accountant. The "high cost of living" probably bothered this couple less than most families because of their ability to manage, and the cheerfulness with which they overcame difficulties of a financial kind.

After three or four years the Dobberfuhrs were raised to a \$50 basis until about fifteen years ago, since which time \$100 per month has kept them nicely, a car being included in the family.

Mrs. Dobberfuhr, even when the twins were born and the three older children small, always had time for embroidery work, did all the family sewing and making over garments, her house was always "homey" and in perfect order. She always did her share of entertaining the visiting ministers and church families and somehow never had that "bedraggled mother look" that many women have with only one or two children to care for. The youngest child now toddles around, and the mother still retains her good looks and ability to manage a well ordered household, which after all is the greatest of arts.

Rev. Dobberfuhr has also conducted a parochial school here for over twenty years. The members still hold their pastor in great esteem and after their interests were in common so long, the parting is hard. A surprise dinner was arranged by the members after the Sunday service.

## SELLWOOD LOSES TO ESTACADA LEGION NINE

### VANCOUVER BARRACKS WILL PLAY GAME HERE NEXT SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Estacada Legionnaires kept up their winning streak here Sunday afternoon, winning from the Sellwood aggregation by the score of 7 to 3. It was a hard fought game until the first half of the ninth inning when Estacada staged the winning rally.

Sellwood scored two runs in the second inning, and another in the fifth. Estacada made two tallies in the fourth frame, and was unable to get another run over until the ninth, going into the last inning one run behind the Portland club.

Russell led off in the ninth with a single, followed by Bronson, who got three bases on his hit to left center, scoring Russell. Minto got a two bagger and Bronson came home. T. Seales grounded out to shortstop and Fischer walked. Miller was safe on Contretra's error. Ray Lovelace hit a single and Fischer and Miller came home, which completely spoiled the Sellwood club's hopes of winning the contest.

Moreland went into the box for the home team but became ill in the second inning and was relieved by Russell. Off Moreland the Sellwood club got two hits for as many runs. Russell held the visitors to five hits and one run in the other seven innings of the game. Galloway was hit for 13 safeties when he was relieved by Dr. Besson in the ninth and he was pounded for two hits.

Minto and Haight, new second and third basemen, were in the lineup for the first time and showed up fine. Haight had six chances on assists and handled every one of them perfectly. Minto was charged with one error, but more than made up for it when he faced the pitcher, getting a two bagger and two singles in four times at the plate. Haight got a double for five times up.

The regulars played their usual good game, though the heaviest hitters as a general rule apparently had on off day, or the visiting club was unusually lucky.

Estacada should have been allowed a run in the eighth inning when A. Lovelace had second base stolen when Haight hit one over the fence for a double, but was held on third by the umpire. However, Demmon, who has given satisfaction as an umpire in every game in which he has worked was watching the ball as it wended its way over the left field fence and called it exactly as he saw it. This run would have tied the score, with one out. K. Scales was up next and an effort was made to put over the squeeze play, and when the batter attempted to bunt, the ball was high and he popped it into the air for a double play.
