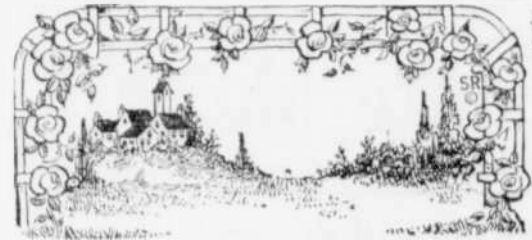
## PRE-SCHOOL CLINIC TO BE HELD AUGUST 24
