FERTILIZER INCREASES STRENGTH OF PLANTS

Test plots of fertilizers on barley, conducted on the farms of Gust Jaeger of Wilsonville and George Kohl of Logan, show that nitrogen applied in the form of amonia sulphate, greatly increase the stoolings of the plants. This stooling resulted in a thicker stand.
Other fertilizers including a special mix of phosphorus and nitrogen, phosphorus in the form of super phosphate, landplaster and lime, were used. Samples from each plot have been sent to the Oregon Agricultural College to be threshed and acre yields estimated.
The value of these fertilizers on clover will be demonstrated next year as red clover was sown with the barley.
The best barley grown by George Kohl was on spots on which frosted potatoes had been turned under the year before. According to Mr. Kohl, "No matter how much commercial fertilizer is used, humus in the form of barnyard manure, or rotted plants will be essential if soil fertility is to be improved."
