LEGIONNAIRES COMPLETE THE SEASON'S SCHEDULE BY 13 TO 0 VICTORY

Estacada Legionnaires defeated Sherwood here Sunday afternoon by a score of 13 to 0 in a poor exhibition of baseball. The home team connected with Cole for a total of 19 hits and Russell held the visitors to six scattered singles.

Features of the game were the home runs by Russell and Fischer. Two base hits were common throughout the game, which was called in the seventh inning.

COUNTY FAIR GIVES PROMISE OF SUCCESS

BEST RACES AND LARGEST NO. OF EXHIBITS EVER KNOWN ARE ASSURED.

Clackamas county fair this year will surpass all previous events from a standpoint of exhibits is the belief of committees in charge of the work at the grounds at Canby. Long before the opening day all available space for exhibits will be occupied and it is said that the board of directors will find it difficult to accommodate all exhibitors, even with the additional space provided this year.

All ready much of the space has been spoken for and there are a number of communities formerly interested in the Canby fair who have not yet made arrangements for their exhibits.

With the new buildings and improvements just completed on the grounds, the association is better prepared to handle the crowds and exhibits than ever before and there is no reason why this meeting should not be of greater interest to the people of Clackamas county than ever before.

The agricultural exhibits without the least doubt, will be good, representing various communities, grange, farm bureau and civic organizations in the county.

The boys and girls club work, according to County Club Leader R. C. Kuehner, will exceed former years by great odds. This is made possible by the construction of a new stock barn for the club work during the past summer.

Many concessions have all ready been provided and the amusements will be plenty. Camping privileges are available this year, as in previous years, and it is said that many people in remote parts of the county will camp here during the week and enjoy the whole session.

This year the fair board has joined the North Pacific Fair association, which places Clackamas County Fair on the racing circuit, and the races this year will feature some of the best horses in the Northwest as well as some eastern horses of a wide and favorable reputation.

L. Kendall, superintendent of the race program, was in Spokane last week and made arrangements for the entry of nearly twenty fast animals for the events in Canby September 18, 19, 20 and 21.

Improvements at the grounds have practically been completed and the new buildings are ready to be occupied. The new grandstand will accommodate a larger crowd than has ever attended a fair in this county and there is every reason to believe that the fair this year will be an epochal event—the best ever presented on the grounds at Canby.

The Estacada band has been employed to provide music for the fair during the entire four days.

SCHEDULE ADOPTED FOR PLAYING OFF TIE

ESTACADA, OSWEGO AND HILLSBORO TO PLAY 4 GAMES FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Each of the three teams tied for the second half championship of the Portland Valley Baseball league, will play four games for the honor of playing off with Oswego, winner of the first half, for the championship cup.

At a meeting of league officials held in Portland Monday night the following schedule was adopted to settle the three-way tie:

August 26, at Oswego—Oswego vs. Hillsboro, first game; Oswego vs. Estacada, second game.

Sunday, September 2, at Hillsboro—First game, Hillsboro vs. Estacada; second game, Hillsboro vs. Oswego. Sunday, September 9, at Estacada—Estacada vs. Oswego, first game; Estacada vs. Hillsboro, second game.

The winner of this series, in case Estacada or Hillsboro should win, will play a series with Oswego for the league championship.

The games will start each Sunday at 1:15 instead of 2:30, the hour set for the starting of league games.

An effort was made to get the Vaughan street grounds in Portland for the playoff, but the field was not available, the city league of Portland having engaged the park during the absence of the Beavers.

The remaining games to be played by the teams of the Portland Valley league will be umpired by Gus Hanke and Jackson, classed as the best umpires in the league this year. They will both be used in each game.
