### FARMERS PLACE ORDERS FOR AGRICULTURAL LIME

(By John J. Inskeep)

Farmers living south of Molalla are pooling orders for a car of agricultural limestone to be purchased from the state lime plant at Salem, in the near future.

Albert Eyeman has agreed to receive orders for his community, which will purchase at least one car.

Henry Kylo expects to sow five acres of alfalfa next spring and will distribute ten tons of lime on the ground some time this fall.

The price of ground limestone shipped in bags is \$7.95 per ton f. o. b. any point on the Southern Pacific in Clackamas county. When the bags are returned the state lime plant makes a refund of 10c each, making a net cost of \$5.95 per ton.

The Portland Electric Power Co. has reduced lime rates on its lines and lime may now be purchased for \$6.45 net f. o. b. Estacada and somewhat cheaper at Boring and Eagle Creek.

Lime orders may be placed through the county agent's office or through local pools. The county agent will help any community wanting to pool orders.

**Interest in Weed Control**

Clackamas county farmers are manifesting great interest in the use of sodium chlorate and other chemicals for killing morning glory, Canadian thistle and other weeds.

Tests at the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis show that sodium chlorate, used as a spray, effectively controls quack grass, morning glory or bindweed. A weed killing demonstration was held in July on the Stone farm at Highland. A checkup shows that both sodium chlorate and sodium arsenate are effective killers of Canadian thistle and evergreen blackberry.

This being the first season that sodium chlorate has been extensively used for this purpose on the coast, the supply of this chemical is exhausted. The chemical companies have written the county agent's office for estimates of next year's needs, and promises a dependable supply at reasonable prices.

**Vetch for Fertilizer**

The use of vetch as a green manure crop is clearly demonstrated on land farmed by H. C. Compton, Boring, and Walter Stone, Highland. The recommendation of the use of vetch for this purpose, where clover can not be profitably grown, has met with criticism from farmers who may have waited too late in the season before turning the crop of vetch under.

H. C. Compton plowed under a crop of vetch and oats early in May and afterwards double disced the land. Late potatoes were planted in July. The potato plants have made a rapid growth in spite of the fact that this ground had been grainfed for forty years. The soil also has retained moisture unusually well.

Walter Stone plowed under a crop of vetch, about May 1, and sowed a crop of oats on the land immediately. The oats are heavy and promise a good yield.
