

### HORSE RACING TO BE COUNTY FAIR FEATURE

**SOME OF BEST RACING STOCK IN NORTHWEST LINED UP FOR CANBY PROGRAM**

As horse races are to be among the main events at the Clackamas county fair this year, Lloyd Kendall of Canby, who is superintendent of racing this year, has already lined up 50 head of some of the best racing horses in the Northwest.

Not only will there be trotters, pacers, but also running races for the running races are to be big attractions. It was noticeable that last year many of the fair visitors desired the horse races as in former years, the 1927 fair being without a racing program, and with Kendall selecting a bunch of horses in the Yakima country he has promised some of the best races in the history of the county fair.

There will be three races each afternoon, the first being a 2:25 trot in three heats, for which a purse of \$200 has been put up; the second, a 2:12 pace, three heats, for a purse of \$250; the running race to follow, this to be made up in the overnight entries. The same program will be carried out on the second day of the fair, and the third day will be a 2:18 trot in three heats, followed by a free-for-all pace, the former race for a purse of \$250 and the latter for \$300. These two races will be followed by the running races.

The rules of the North Pacific Racing association will govern the races.

All superintendents of the departments have been selected, and from these their departments will largely be filled this year. The judging of all exhibits, according to W. H. Kanne, secretary, will start on the first day of the fair, and the exhibits must be in place by the opening of the fair, September 18.

The following are the department heads of the fair this year: H. H. Chindgren, livestock; H. W. Kanne, pavilion and advertising; W. B. Lawton, amusements and dancing; Brenton Vedder, gate and grandstand; W. W. Everhardt, treasurer; W. W. Everhardt, chief entry clerk; Byron O. Garrett, publicity manager. The advisory committees are John R. Humphreys, Oregon City chamber of commerce; O. R. Daugherty, Greater Clackamas union of clubs; S. A. Roberts, farm bureau; B. O. Garrett, Oregon City Kiwanis club; M. C. Buxton, Clackamas County Jersey cattle club.

Avon Jesse of Canby will have charge of the floral department; Mrs. A. H. Knight, the domestic science; Mrs. Carl Joehnk, textile; Mrs. W. H. Thompson, poultry and Martin Stauber, dancing.

There is much activity on the fair grounds, and the opening day, which is to be children's day, will find the grounds a most inviting place as many improvements have been made this year. New buildings are being erected, and the girls and boys 4-H club building, which is to be used as a livestock barn, will be dedicated on the opening day. H. C. Seymour of Corvallis, at the head of the state work of the 4-H club, is to be present.

The club members are assisting in erecting the structure, and a number of organizations are also donating towards the building.

The structure is 60x100 feet and is the most attractive livestock barn on the fair grounds. Instead of the single aisle as in other barns on the grounds there are two, one at each side with large entrance ways.

Buxton Bros. of Molalla, who are breeders of purebred Jerseys, have contributed towards the building fund by donating to the club members of Clackamas county a purebred Jersey bull calf, which is to be disposed of in any manner the members see fit. The calf has an excellent pedigree, and no doubt will command a good price.

Many club members are to enter livestock at the 1928 fair, according to the county club agent, R. C. Kuehler.
