LETTER TO THE EDITOR

To add insult to injury, they left a dirty, unsanitary camp ground. It would seem as though anyone would know better than to leave a fire under conditions as they existed on that particular day.

No rain of any consequence had fallen for fifty days. The day was hot and sultry and burning conditions about as bad as could be, with the humidity down to 12.

If this fire had not been discovered by a good citizen and reported promptly to the Squaw Mountain firemen, a very expensive and disastrous fire would have occurred.

The very huckleberry patches that this criminally careless camper so carefully combed would have been destroyed and in all probability the adjoining green timber and watershed. Surely, some of the adults as well as the children, need a keeper when they stray from their own doorway.
