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## CLACKAMAS COUNTY FAIR ENDS FRIDAY

ATTENDANCE LARGEST IN THE HISTORY OF CANBY SHOW REPORTS INDICATE

Friday (today) is the closing date of the most successful fair ever held in Clackamas county, from the standpoint of attendance, as well as exhibits. The opening day, despite the rain with a gate equal to that of the record day last year.

Thursday was the big day of the four-day show. Feature events of the day were the baby clinic under the supervision of Dr. W. H. Miller, county health officer; closing of the merchants' carnival; sham battle fire works drama "The Birth of a Nation" and the "Spirit of No Man's Land" by Company D of the 186th infantry.

Today is Union of Clubs day, and a program has been arranged for this day that will be filled with interesting events. Among those will be a fiddlers' contest and the fourth annual banquet of the Union of clubs, which will held at 6:15 in the evening. The program during the banquet will include, "America, invocation, address of welcome, response, committee reports, vocal solo by Miss Woodside, address, "Flax" by Colonel Bartrum, who will also display flax products; and awarding of cup for best physical boy or girl.

Marion county club is expected to be represented by one hundred members, and will bring along the Hubbard band.

Music for the entire program is being furnished by the Estacada band of 21 pieces. They make the trip back and forth each day by auto bus, C. A. Dykes, member of the band, furnishing the transportation.

Eastern Clackamas county folks are attending in large numbers, and on Thursday there was an unusually large representation from Estacada and surrounding section.

The racing program each day has been a big drawing card, with the feature races to be held Friday afternoon, as one of the closing events of the big show.

## SPRINGWATER FAIR IS AWARDED FIRST PRIZE

RECEIVES OREGON CITY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE \$25 FOR BEST EXHIBIT

Springwater Fair was declared the best community fair given in Clackamas county this year and was given the \$25 cash prize offered by the Oregon City Chamber of Commerce for the best exhibit.

The fair was held Friday of last week and was well attended by local people as well as Estacada and from all sections of Eastern Clackamas county.

While the number of exhibits was not as large as those of former years, this was more than made up in the quality of the products shown. The poultry and livestock on exhibition was high class, as well as the farm, orchard and garden products.

Ed. Shearer had as fine a display of barred rock chickens as one will see at any fair anywhere. There was also a fine exhibit of Rhode Island Reds and turkeys.

Mr. Shibley had his purebred Guernsey herd at the show and they attracted considerable attention.

A large tent was erected for the livestock and the poultry was placed in the shed adjoining the grange hall where the farm products were on exhibit.

In the hall were exhibits of corn, potatoes, beans, several kinds of nuts, tomatoes, grapes, apples, melons, pears, prunes, etc., a fine assortment of each, as well as flowers, canned goods and needlework.

One portion of the building was taken up with 4-H Girls and Boys' club work exhibits, which were of a very high order.

Music was furnished during the day by the Estacada band. A speaking program was given in the afternoon. O. M. Plummer of the Pacific International Livestock exhibition being the principal speaker.

A fine dinner was served by the Springwater ladies, which was enjoyed by the large crowd in attendance.

The fair, taken as a whole, was a big success, and due credit is given the officers of the board for their efforts, and to those who brought in their exhibits.

BROTHER OF GOVERNOR BUYS HOMESITE ON SANDY RIVER BLUFF NEAR SCHOOL

One of the most attractive homesites on the Bluff road has been sold by Fred Strong to Mr. and Mrs. Patterson of Portland. The lot is 275 feet wide, and extends down the bluff, adjoining the George Strong place.

Mr. Patterson looked at acreage up the mountain but liked the bluff the best. He is a brother of Governor I. L. Patterson and plans to build a lovely home in which to spend about five months of the year.

George Beers, Sandy real estate man, reports the sale of five acres of the Henry Cook place to Mrs. Edith Jennings of Portland. A site will be cleared at once for building a large modern residence, which will be electrically lighted and Sandy water will be installed. The location is on the Mt. Hood Loop highway, a short distance west of Cedar Creek.
