

With the County Agent

The county agent's office is equipped with apparatus for testing soil for lime requirements.

Soil to be tested should be taken in five or more places in a field. A small hole is dug and a slice of soil six or eight inches deep taken from the side of the hole. Slices of earth from various places in the field are mixed into a composite sample which should be brought to the county agent's office dry.

It takes but a few minutes to test dry soil for acidity. Wet soil cannot be tested.

The Portland Cement association recently published a book entitled, "Plans for Concrete Farm Buildings" which describes the best methods of mixing concrete for different purposes and gives plans for building many kinds of farm buildings, tanks and other farm conveniences. This book may be obtained on request to the county agent's office.

Farmers who are interested in soil types and the management of each type, may receive for the asking, a soil map of Clackamas county. This map drawn from a survey made by the United States department of agriculture shows in color each soil type and is accompanied by a descriptive booklet. School teachers as well as farmers will be sent a map on request.

W. H. Zivney, president of the State Potato Growers association, and Prof. G. R. Hyslop of the Oregon Agricultural College have announced a meeting of the potato growers of the state on November 7. At this meeting Seymour Jones, state marketing agent, will set the standard of grades by which Oregon potatoes will be marketed in the future. The meeting will be held at 9:30 a. m., in the restaurant room at the Pacific International livestock show and all Oregon growers are invited to attend.

Bulbous blue grass will be compared with English rye grass for pasture by V. C. Doppie, Libearl. This grass, which is highly rated as a pasture crop for soils which dry out in early spring has been used but little if at all in Clackamas county. Seed was furnished by the Oregon Agricultural College for trial by Ellnor Hanley Bush of Medford.
