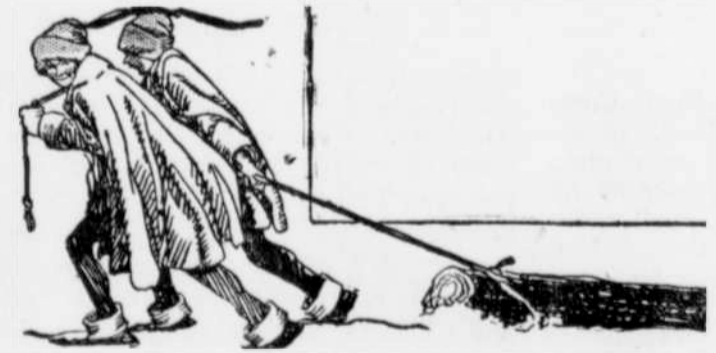

Has Water Plan

Editor News:—I am pleased to note that you have undertaken to inform the people of Estacada of the condition of the water system. Having had considerable experience in the past with this particular system, I know something about the existing conditions, and I am satisfied that the time is here when some definite action must be taken.

I have what I believe to be a practical plan for a gravity water system of sufficient capacity for Estacada, that can be handled without an excessive expenditure. In fact, I believe that a supply of pure water for the town can be had without going into debt to the limit allowed for a corporation of the property valuation of Estacada, which proposition I will be glad to submit to the new city council as soon as it is ready to take action on the water problem, regardless of whether I am elected mayor next Tuesday.

There is, too, the method of a well and pumping plant as a means of a pure water supply. However, if a gravity system can be managed, as I believe it can, it would be far better, even if the cost was greater.

Assuring you that I approve of the stand taken by the News on this matter, and of my interest in securing an adequate water system for Estacada, I am, yours truly,
