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L. A. CHAPMAN CHOSEN MAYOR OF ESTACADA

**PERRY WINS OVER ELLIS; TED
AHLBERG ELECTED AS
CITY RECORDER**

L. A. Chapman, sticker candidate for mayor of Estacada, was elected by a decisive majority in Tuesday's election, receiving 103 votes to 50 cast for A. G. Ames and 64 for John Lovelace.

Chapman himself knew nothing of the movement to elect him to the office. He was out of town all day, returning in the evening just in time to cast his vote. Chapman was offered the nomination some time ago, but refused to be a candidate. Had he accepted the place on the regular ticket it is not likely that there would have been an opposing candidate.

John Osborne was elected councilman in Ward I with 200 votes; J. C. Kiggins received 204 votes in Ward 2 and A. H. Perry received 116 in Ward 3 to 91 cast for R. G. Ellis.

Ted Ahlberg, candidate for city recorder, was elected with 141 votes, W. A. Heylman receiving 54 for this office. Mrs. N. B. Ecker, who was unopposed for treasurer, received 195 votes.

Doubt as to whether Chapman would serve as mayor was removed when he issued the following statement:

"My friends having honored me by their votes, and indicated in this way their wish that I serve them in the capacity of mayor of our city, I can do no less than accept the office and endeavor to fill the same in a way that will be deserving of their appreciation.

"This honor was unsolicited by me and in accepting the office I do so without making any promises or statements as to the future conduct of the same, only that my aim will ever be for all that stands for the betterment of our city.

"I realize that my individual efforts can accomplish nothing, but with the full co-operation of the council and people, taking up the various civic problems as they appear, much may be accomplished for the good of all concerned.

"So let us make co-operation our slogan and let everyone boost and pull together for anything that stands for the good and betterment of the city."

SHERIFF MASS WINS BY LARGE MAJORITY

**HOOVER-CURTIS TICKET TAKES
ALMOST TWO TO ONE LEAD
IN THE COUNTY**

Clackamas county re-elected E. T. Mass Tuesday by a large plurality, he being the only democrat to carry the county. Mass received 9245 votes to 3684 polled by George Randall.

The Hoover Curtis ticket carried the county with 9226 votes to 5853 for the Smith-Robinson combination.

Hawley was re-elected by a large majority, carrying this county over Starkweather, a Clackamas county man, 8436 to 5544. Upton A. Upton, socialist candidate, polled approximately 5,000 votes in the district.

Hal Hoss won by an enormous majority, his home county giving him 11,234 votes, as compared with 2655 polled by his democratic opponent.

The grange income tax measure carried in Clackamas county by approximately 2000 votes, but was turned down in the state.

The two Estacada precincts gave Hoover a large majority, the ratio being 2-1-2 to 1. Springwater gave a 3 to 1 majority for Hoover while Eagle Creek precinct gave Smith 6 more votes than Hoover.

The complete returns for justice of the peace for this district have not been received. S. E. Wooster was leading C. V. Martin in the two Estacada precincts, with the result in Springwater, Garfield, George and Eagle Creek unknown.

LEGIONNAIRES PLAN MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

**DRIVE TO REACH QUOTA SET
FOR 1929 BY END OF NEXT
WEEK, NOVEMBER 17**

Estacada Legion post won two citations last year for their efforts in their membership campaign, one of these citations being from National Commander Spafford. A drive is starting now to exceed for 1929 the membership of this year, and the quota set is 75. Already a dozen or more members have been signed who were not members of Carl Douglass Post last year.

Dr. W. W. Gilbert and C. Rex Parks are team captains for the big drive, and a board is being placed in a conspicuous place in town that the progress of the campaign may be watched constantly until the post goes over the top. Armistice Day is the date for the real opening of the drive.

The meeting of the post held on Monday of this week was largely attended and one of the most enthusiastic ever held by the post. The committee appointments for the year were announced by the commander, L. E. Townsend, as follows, chairmen only being named:

Legislation, W. W. Smith; Hospitalization and rehabilitation, J. C. Moreland; Americanism, Dr. W. W. Gilbert; Boy Scouts, S. E. Lawrence; Community Service, G. E. Parks; Child Welfare, Harry Kitching; Aviation, Bob Cooke; Land Settlement, Paul Holm; Trophy and Awards, G. C. Kiggins.

Community Service will be the major activity of the Legion in the state during the coming year. G. E. Parks, who is chairman of this activity in the local post, is district chairman of the same committee in the district comprising Clackamas, Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop counties. A meeting of the different committee chairmen, the officers and executive committee of the post will be held next Monday night for the purpose of formulating a program for the coming year.

The post has voted to sponsor the Estacada Boy Scouts as a part of the service program.

The committee appointed to have the sign re-painted on the school building as a guide to airplanes, reported that the sign had been completed, the material being furnished by the post and the work having been done by the boys manual training class of the high school. The letters in the sign, "Estacada" are ten feet high and six feet wide.

READY FOR WINTER SPORTS

A new ski jump on Multnor hill is complete. The work was done by Ole Langerud, prominent ski jumper. It is graded and rocked like a highway, starts at the top 16 feet wide and from takeoff widens to over one hundred feet. All stumps and snags were removed, making it smooth as a field, and the brush has been cut 300 feet farther back than last year. The Mt. Hood Ski club will give tournaments there this winter. Boyd Summers and F. W. Herman of Rainier and Langerud were partners in building the new jump.
