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LA DEE BUNKHOUSES DESTROYED BY FIRE

MATERIAL BEING RUSHED TO REPLACE BUILDINGS AND MEN ON THE JOB

A destructive fire which started in the oil house at the LaDee Logging camp Saturday evening at about 7 o'clock consumed all the bunk houses and the employees were without shelter that night and were obliged to come to Estacada and were taken into Portland Sunday morning.

The dining hall and cook house was saved, also some of the cottages occupied by families.

There were about one hundred men employed at the camp, who were thrown out of work, and it is not known when operations will be resumed.

No estimate was given as to the loss incurred. Many of the men lost their clothing and personal effects, amounting in some instances to \$200 per man, it is said.

The destroyed buildings are to be replaced immediately, lumber having been shipped this week and other material is being assembled as rapidly as possible. Twenty-one kegs of nails went up on the train Wednesday morning.

A crew of men are engaged in building a road out from Camp 1-2 which when completed will allow additional logging operations, and will also mean the employment of a larger force of men.

While the fire would not have delayed work very long, ordinarily, it is believed that logging operations will not be resumed to any great extent until after the first of the year. By the time the new camp is completed it will about the usual time for closing for the holidays.

BUDGET FOR COUNTY WILL TOTAL \$954,204

SLIGHT INCREASE OVER THAT OF 1928 REPORTED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

OREGON CITY, Nov. 28.—The 1929 budget for Clackamas county completed Monday and made public by the budget committee and the county court, will call for the total expenditure of \$954,204.20 during the year. This figure represents an increase of \$38,943.20 over the 1928 budget.

The total appropriated in the general county fund amounts to \$434,641.90 as compared to \$312,812.98 for the 1928 appropriation. The emergency fund has been increased from \$32,000 to \$40,000 and the estimated receipts are \$35,500 and in 1928 the amount was listed at \$31,180.00.

The budget committee set aside \$50,000 as a sinking fund for a new courthouse, allowed the county fair board \$3500 to carry on the fair, and \$5000 for improvements on the fair grounds. The state fair and international livestock show exhibits from Clackamas county were given a fund of \$1200. A fund of \$500 was established for making of ownership maps for the county.

The request of the W. C. T. U. for \$10,000 to construct a Clackamas county cottage at the children's farm home at Corvallis was rejected.

Following are the allowances for the various departments for 1929:

Circuit court, \$7500; county court, \$5700; justice court, \$5000; sheriff, \$15000; tax department, \$11,555; county clerk, \$8875; recorder, \$7071; raffie officer, \$2100; treasurer, \$4410; assessor, \$12,110; health officer, \$7680; coroner, \$900; school superintendent, \$7870; auditor, \$2500; court house \$4670.

The estimates of the county high school tuition fund are \$103,237 for 1929, as compared to \$88,000 last year; county school and library fund, \$156,825; market road fund, \$75,000 same as last year; an increase of \$5000 in the general road fund to \$220,000.

The total revenues are placed at \$35,000 and estimated receipts from other sources are, state funds for schools, \$22,229; market road fund from the state, \$75,000; motor vehicle fund, \$70,000.

Items in the general fund are: printing \$2000, relief \$22000, welfare department \$1700, widow's pension \$14000, soldiers' pensions \$1500, insane \$100, elections \$7000, county agent \$2450, club leader \$1895, cattle indemnity \$3000, scalp bounty \$450, tax rebates \$500.

Forest patrol county \$1000, state \$500, damages \$2500, auditing \$900, retire warrants \$10,000, interest on warrants \$5000, redeem road bonds \$60,000, interest on road bonds \$76,900, emergency \$40,000, accident insurance and compensation \$10,000, court house sinking fund \$50,000, ownership maps \$500, state and international livestock exhibits \$1200, district attorney \$1000; total \$316,595.

The date of the annual budget meeting will be set this week by the county officials. The budget is signed by John R. Oatfield, chairman; J. W. Kruse, secretary; W. A. Proctor, R. A. Wright, J. R. Hall and G. H. Brown.

Makes First Team at O. S. A. C.

Florence Reed of Estacada, junior in home economics, has been placed on the first team of the junior volleyball squad. Of 236 women registered in volleyball, 68 have been placed on class teams. All of the eight teams will play games each night from November 23 to December 5. Championship tilts have been scheduled for December 6 and 7.

Springwater Makes Levy

Springwater road district voted a \$3850 tax and re-elected H. O. Cromer as supervisor. Dover voted a 10 mill tax; Dodge 10 mills; Bull Run 10 mills; Sandy 3 mills; Cherryville 10 mills; Damascus 5 mills and Lower Highlands 10 mills. But two districts in the county reporting failed to vote an additional road tax.

JURY FAILS TO AGREE IN EARL JONES CASE

NEW TRAIL FOR BORING YOUTH CHARGED WITH DYNAMITING HOME LAST MAY

After deliberating twelve hours Saturday afternoon and evening the jury in the case of Earl Jones, charged with murder, reported that there was no possibility of reaching a decision and were discharged by Judge J. U. Campbell at Oregon City.

According to the foreman of the jury, twenty-five ballots were taken and for most part they were equally divided for conviction and acquittal. None were in favor of a first degree murder conviction, and but one in favor of second degree murder. The deliberation was on a manslaughter conviction, the vote being seven for conviction to five for acquittal.

Jones had been out on bond for some time, and unless he can give bond, a new jury will be called at once for another trial, it was reported from Oregon City. The next regular jury term will not be held for about six months.

Earl was charged with having dynamited the home of his parents near Boring last spring. In the explosion the boy's stepmother and step brother was killed, while the father lost a leg and other members of the family more or less injured.
