PRUNING DEMONSTRATIONS TO BE HELD NEXT WEEK

C. L. Long, extension horticulturist of the Oregon State Agricultural college, will visit Clackamas county January 10 and 11, for the purpose of holding pruning demonstrations and giving orchard management talks.

On Thursday, January 10, at 1:30 p. m., a meeting will be held on the Richard Davis farm at Carus. Prune growers from Clarkes and Carus will attend.

The next meeting will be held in the orchard of Peter Erickson at Springwater, Friday, January 11, at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Mr. Long will hold the last meeting on the A. W. Botkin orchard at Garfield on Friday, January 11, at 1:30 p. m. Growers are invited to attend and inspect trees pruned for demonstration purposes in 1928 by Mr. Long and County Agent Inskip.

The county agent is endeavoring to obtain a start of disease free Garnet Chili potato seed by sending two lots of seed to the Oregon State Agricultural college for greenhouse tests. These lots of seed were furnished by Henry Kylo and Arthur Brockart of Molalla.

The farm crops department will grow a plant from one eye of each potato furnished. Potatoes producing the eyes developing clean plants will be returned to the grower, who will carefully protect the increase. It is hoped to eventually produce a disease free strain.

Had Joint Christmas Tree

Bull Run grade school and Sunday school had a joint Christmas program and tree for the children, all of whom were made happy with a treat. The program was appreciated by all.

DAVID GIGER HANGS HIMSELF IN BARN

FARMER OF GARFIELD DISTRICT ENDS LIFE MONDAY; NO REASON KNOWN

David Giger, 56, prosperous farmer residing on the Huxley place a short distance from Estacada, committed suicide Monday morning by hanging himself in his barn, after having eaten a hearty breakfast. No cause for his action was known to exist.

When the body was found the coroner was notified and when he arrived, he and L. A. Chapman went out and took the body down and brought it to the Chapman undertaking parlors in Estacada.

Funeral services were held under the auspices of the Estacada Odd Fellows, Rev. C. T. Cook officiating. Another service was held at the Syrma church, near Canby, where the burial took place.

Mr. Giger was born in Orville, O., April 7, 1872. When five years old he moved with his parents to Silverton, Oregon, and has spent most of his life in Oregon.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Lavina Giger, and a daughter, Mrs. Grace Wyville of Portland, and a son, Gordon, of Los Angeles; also his mother, four sisters and five brothers beside many other relatives.

He came to Estacada less than a year ago and with a partner bought the Huxley place, and was supposed to be a successful farmer. He was held in high esteem by those with whom he came in contact.

L. A. Chapman, Estacada mortician, had charge of the funeral arrangements.
