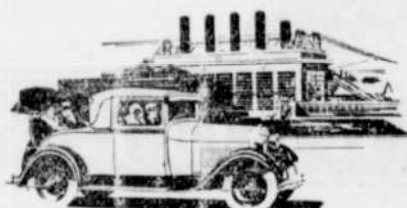

**Oregon Man Reports on Serious Plant Disease**

Curly top disease, for many years the major disease of sugar beets and now known to attack tomatoes, cucumbers, cantaloupes, beans, squash and many other vegetables and ornamentals, is the outstanding unsolved disease problem of the West. This was the word taken to New York by Prof. M. B. McKay, pathologist at the Oregon experiment station, who was sent to the annual meeting of the American association for the advancement of science by the United States department of agriculture to report his investigations.

Prof. McKay discovered two years ago that the western yellow tomato blight, bean blight and kindred baffling troubles are in reality curly top, which has since been found to attack at least 11 truck crops and half dozen ornamentals.

Ravages of the disease in sugar beet areas have been such that a total of 22 sugar factories have been abandoned or put out of business temporarily in the Rocky Mountain region: In one year only three mills out of nine operated in Idaho.

Geographical distribution of the disease is roughly between the Rocky mountains and the Cascades, extending from Canada to Mexico. Isolated reports of it have been had from farther east at times, he said, and the disease has also invaded the Willamette valley, 1926 being its worst year to date.

The disease is spread only by a minute leaf hopper, which carries the virus from plant to plant on which it feeds. Once having taken the virus a hopper then is a carrier of it thru-out its life. These hoppers winter over in the desert regions, hence are serious in the adjacent semi-arid regions, though in bad years the hoppers migrate for a season to other localities where it may be too humid for them to winter over.

Control of these hoppers has thus far proved impossible, hence the only control for the disease now in prospect is development of resistant varieties, according to Prof. McKay. Already resistant squash varieties are known and this year one good bush bean out of 22 varieties tried in an

infested area proved fully resistant. In sugar beet areas a means of predicting bad hopper years has been developed at which times planting of beets is reduced, to be later expanded in seasons when hopper damage is lighter.

During a scuffle in a low dance hall where the girl was engaged, the captain recognizes his son from a scar and he has him and the girl shanghaied and brought on the ship. They set sail and the boy is placed in the dungeon with the mate. The crew later mutiny and through the efforts of the girl both men are freed, and the captain infuriated blows up his ship just after the crew and the boy and girl escape, while he and the mate are lost.
