PLANTING OF GAME FISH IN OREGON STREAMS UNDER WAY

The return of good weather has enabled the hatchery department of the State Game Commission to continue its work of distributing fish to the various streams of Oregon. The work of planting was held up for more than three weeks on account of bad weather. Tom Craig, in charge of the work of planting, is now busy with the commission's "fish pullman" taking six inch trout from the Roaring river and Delph Creek hatcheries. These are being planted in the streams adjacent to the hatcheries, and when the work is completed trout will be taken from other stations. All plantings are made of trout six inches or more in length.

Fruit Salad

- 2 diced apples.
- Half dozen marshmallows, cut fine.
- 2 bananas, diced
- 2 stalks celery, cut fine
- Half dozen walnuts cut fine
- 6 garnishing cherries cut fine
- 1 small can pineapple, diced
