HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics)

When boiling ham to be used cold, letting it cool in the liquor in which it has been cooked helps to make it juicy and tender.

A delicious icing for a layer cake consists of one pound of confectioners' sugar creamed with one-half cup of butter, three tablespoonfuls of cold coffee, two teaspoonfuls of cocoa and one teaspoonful of vanilla extract. These are mixed thoroughly and spread on the cake.

When baking doughnuts, a small piece of raw potato dropped into the hot fat will prevent the doughnuts from burning.

It is well to have a definite recipe for meringue, then it will seldom fail. Two egg whites, half teaspoon of vanilla extract, four teaspoonfuls of pulverized sugar and a pinch of salt has been found a good recipe for this purpose.

When serving grapefruit it is made easier for the person eating it, if the center core is removed, cut around the edge of the juicy membrane and cut into individual sections by severing the connecting tissue. A cherry placed in the center improves the appearance.

Syrups from canned fruits may be kept and blended for making jell desserts. They give an unusual flavor and often a nice color.

FERTILIZER APPLICATION BASED ON SOIL AND CROP

Fertilizers applied in Oregon to plowed land and mixed with the soil by cultivation will furnish plant food for crops this summer. The amount of plant food in a fertilizer is on a tag on each bag and this analysis is the basis for the comparison of fertilizer values. The particular soil and the crop to be grown require study to determine the fertilizer which will probably give the best results.

Test applications on small areas will show the power of a fertilizer to increase yields. If the yield increase does not pay a profit above the cost of the fertilizer its use is unwarranted. Circular 87, "Commercial Fertilizers," and bulletin 237, "Liming Western Oregon Soils," have been issued recently by the Oregon experiment station. Farmers may obtain them by fall.
