## COURT LETS CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE AT SANDY

**BIDS ARE BEING CALLED ON BRIDGE NEAR BARTON ON CLACKAMAS RIVER**

Rigdon Bros. of Woodburn will be awarded the contract for building the Revenue bridge near Sandy, the bids for the structure having been opened by the county court, Monday. There were six proposals, the lowest being \$8665.50.

The span is to be 145 feet in length and the approach approximately 100 feet.

The rebuilding of the Rock Creek bridge three miles east of Clackamas is included in the bridge building program of the county. Bids on this project are being called and the contract is to be awarded on May 13. The work will consist of constructing a 150-foot standard frame trestle and a laminated deck.

The county court is to also advertise for bids for building of approaches to the Barton bridge across the Clackamas near Barton. Work on this span will include two acres of clearing, 7500 lineal feet of cedar piling and 1000 lineal feet of superstructure. The county will furnish the materials, including the hardware and paint. Bids are to be opened on May 13.

## PAGH SAWMILL MOVES TO NEW BODY OF TIMBER

DOVER, April 25.—(Special).—Pagh's finished cutting the timber adjacent to their mill on Monday of this week. Prior to this Elmer Pagh was busy installing the donkey in the new timber and building a new mill site. They will begin on Monday to cut the balance of the Ed Hart timber which they recently purchased. The mill is located on Ralph DeShazer's place, as it affords the easiest access to the timber and road.

The new \$3000 crusher for this district is being installed in the quarry. Fisher, the county crusher man, expects to have it ready for operation on Monday. The county court has ordered market roads two and three improved by scarifying and then widening to 12 feet. Road two will be extended across Bear Creek canyon to the church. This new road was surveyed during the winter.

The shipkee business is a profitable and interesting side line for several of the neighbors. The knees of various sizes are sold through a Portland dealer. Lately all orders have gone into government boats used as revenue cutters. The large part of the knees are made in Ralph DeShazer's sawmill, though some are hewed.

Walter Affholter is going to haul cedar poles for Wm. Todd from the vicinity of Cedar creek on the Loop highway. Mr. and Mrs. Affholter are living on the Corey place on the highway so as to be near his work.

### SEWING CLUB CONTESTS TO BE HELD NEXT MONTH
