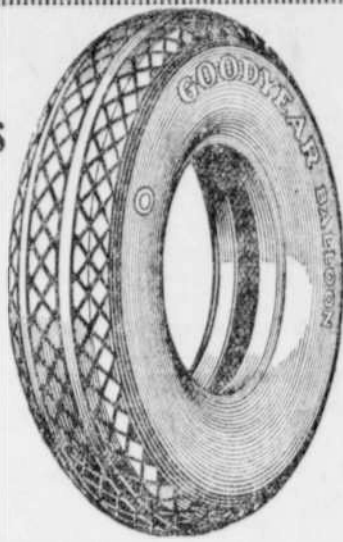

More than three hundred extra players appear in Clara Bow's new starring picture entitled "The Fleet's In!" garbed in the uniform of the United States navy. For the most part the men selected were ex-naval men so that authentic and realistic atmosphere could be obtained.

"The Fleet's In!" is the feature attraction at the Liberty, Estacada, Sunday and Monday next.

The director, before the film was started, insisted that the men portraying "gobs" from Uncle Sam's fleet have previous naval training and experience at sea. Casting directors found a good many numbered among the host of extra players in Hollywood, and a great number of them were engaged in some other work, but gladly took part in the picture for the sake of old times.
