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SELLWOOD DEFEATS ESTACADA TEAM 9-11

OSWEGO TEAM TO PLAY ON LOCAL GROUNDS NEXT SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Estacada's Portland Valley league team lost to Sellwood Pharmacy on the Estacada grounds Sunday afternoon by the score of 9 to 11. The visiting team made two runs in the first inning and Estacada also made two, the pill rollers keeping the lead during the remainder of the game.

The two runs made by Sellwood in the first were due to an error on the part of the shortstop and two runs made in the ninth session were also due to an error in left field.

Ray Lovelace starred for the home club by hitting a homer over the left field fence. Tuma for Estacada hit out a two-bagger in the seventh inning when the bases were loaded. Estacada was shy of pitchers, Heitsman being unable to be among those present, and Ernie Miller went into the box to start the game; was relieved by Tony Bronson who in turn was relieved by Tuma.

The big game of the season is scheduled for next Sunday afternoon when the league leaders, last year and to date, this year, Oswego plays on the Estacada diamond. The lake club has played three games this year with a victory in each case, though one game was successfully protested because Schwartz, pitcher, used a spit ball. TWO THOUSAND CHILDREN IN BLUE RIBBON HEALTH PARADE IN OREGON CITY

Estacada high school band won first prize in the Blue Ribbon health parade of school children, held in Oregon City Saturday. More than two thousand children marched in the parade and the streets were lined with spectators.

Advance school won the prize for having the largest representation of blue ribbon children, regardless of the size of school.
