Within a radius of fifteen miles of Estacada is an area capable of sustaining a population larger than the entire state of Nevada. Thousands and thousands of acres of possible farm lands that will produce a large variety of abundant crops, is now idle; only a small part of it is being utilized for grazing purposes.

In many sections of the South and East farmers are existing on rocky, hillside farms on which the average production per acre is next to nothing as compared with the production of farms in this vicinity. And thousands of those old worn out farms will not produce anything without the use of commercial fertilizers. In parts of the South one-fourth of the income from the farm crops is set aside for fertilizer for the next crop.

Having had considerable experience in the farming business where commercial fertilizers had to be purchased every year at a large expense, and then seeing the wonderful crops grown in Clackamas county without such an additional expense, the possibilities of farming in all its branches here looks very encouraging.

Markets for farm products here are inadequate now, is a common cry among the farmers. This is true so far as many crops grown are concerned, but there are many crops that can be produced at a large profit to the grower. Perhaps the new tariff bill will also bring relief to the farmer in excluding the competition of foreign-grown crops from our markets.

Thousands of potential prosperous homes are awaiting those folks who can't be prosperous on their farms in other parts of the country. If they once could see the crops produced on this soil without expensive preparation, the population of the Northwest would be doubled every few months. But they must be told about this great country, and then it would appear to them to be too wonderful to be true.
