

RICHARD DIX SAYS RUTH ELDER'S CAREER ASSURED

Ruth Elder has a great motion picture future, in the opinion of those who have watched her and worked with her during her first experience as a screen player.

With no previous experience, the girl who was the first of her sex to conquer the Atlantic Ocean by air, performs like a seasoned trouper, according to Frank Strayer, director; and Richard Dix, star of Paramount's "Moran of the Marines," the picture in which she makes her film debut, at the Liberty Theatre, Estacada, Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25.

"Ruth Elder isn't going to have to get by on her reputation," Dix said. "She has talent. She was very nervous before actual shooting of the picture started, but when the cameras

started grinding she forgot herself in her interest in the work and she has really surprised me by her acting ability. I knew that a girl who did what she did would succeed in anything she attempted but the extent to which she is going to succeed will astonish people."

Essay Contest at Gresham Is Finished

Mayor Cleveland, Judge Eastman and Attorney Schneider, acting as judges of the Essay Contest conducted by the First State Bank, of Gresham, on the subject, "The Purpose of Money," have finished their work in judging the essays and rendered their report. They report that the awards were made with great difficulty, in fact, were in favor of the awards being different, but the majority rules. All agreed, however, that essay number 702 was the most original of any and expressed a sincere desire that the same be published, notwithstanding they found it necessary to make the awards otherwise.

Essay number 702 was written by Maurice Dhulst, of the Lusted school. In the high schools, Gresham won both first and second prizes, Vernon Kelly receiving the first prize and Suzanne Lounsbury second. In the grade schools, first prize was awarded to Neva Schmid, of Bridal Veil, Oregon; the second prize to Ruth Walters, of the Currinsville school, near Estacada.

Telephone conversations with the different schools winning prizes was had and the names were furnished by the teachers, the awards to be announced in the schools, at the student body meeting and at the banquet.

The essay of Maurice Dhulst follows:

"The Purpose of Money"

"If you sell something you don't expect to give it away and not get anything for it. You either trade or want something that's called money. Money is what most of us sell something for. Money is a very important thing and without it you can't do very much in this world. In fact, money is so important that nobody can get along without it."

"Long, long ago the people of the world when they sold something, they would trade. If a man had a horse to sell he would trade it for a cow or for something else that he needed. Whenever anybody had anything to sell he would trade it to somebody else for some other thing. After the years went by, the people became tired of trading this way and adopted a new way. Out of the copper, silver and gold they made coins. Out of certain paper they made bills. This was called money and that is what we have today. Each country adopted its own kind of money. Today the United States has the dollar, Great Britain has the pound, France has the franc, Italy has the lira and Germany the mark. Most of the countries have a different name for their money, although there are many that have the same as another country. When a man had something to sell then he would say: 'I want so many dollars,' or 'I want so many francs.' After he had the money he could buy anything he wanted. He did not trade so much any more and began to make good use of his money. For a long time he kept his money in his house, but sometimes it got stolen. He then established the bank in which to save his money. The bank is a very useful place to put your money. It is a safe place and you get a certain percent for letting them use it. The bank carries on the business of the rich business men of today. It loans, sells bonds, issues all kinds of notes and saves money. If it were not for the banks there wouldn't be half so much business today."

"When the new world was discovered and European countries settled over here each colony had the same money as its mother country. After the Revolutionary War was fought and the United States won its independence, it had to make its own money. It was a hard problem to do. George Washington, Alexander Hamilton, Thomas Jefferson and David Rittenhouse were among the leading men. In 1792, Congress passed the act establishing a mint. George Washington appointed David Rittenhouse director of the mint and by October, 1792, the first money was coined. Since then the United States has coined money and is now the wealthiest nation in the world. The United States named its money the dollar."

"Money means a lot and without it you can't do very much. For instance, about the first thing you need is clothes; you need something to wear and if you don't have any money you can't buy them. About the second thing you need is something to eat. If you don't have anything to eat you will die, but if you haven't any money you can't get anything to eat. About the third is a place to sleep. You need a place to sleep because you can't sleep out in the woods in the winter. But if you haven't any money you won't be able to sleep in a bed. If you haven't any money you will have to starve unless somebody takes care of you. If you have a little money, but not much, you probably would like to buy a house, but you can't buy one unless you have more. If you would like to buy an automobile you can't buy one until you have more money. If you save your money and work hard you soon will have enough to buy some of these different things that you would like to have."

"It is not always easy to have money, but if you save a little and put it in the bank it will keep growing and be a large sum. Of course, if you don't save any and don't put any in the bank you won't have much. Some people have so much money in the bank and get so much interest that they live on their interest. Some people as soon as they make a few dollars, the next day they go to town and spend it and that

way they never put any in the bank and never start to save. If you never start to save you never will save. To get money isn't so very hard. You can usually get some job somewhere if you are interested enough in working. If you do not like to work you will not get very much, but if you are interested in some kind of work you will soon have a little money. If you put this money in the bank instead of spending it for something that you really don't need, some day you may be rich. If you never work you never will have any money, and if you never save you never will have any money. If you save you will have money and money is what makes life a pleasure."
