You also know that it may float unnoticed unless there is a receiving set tuned in to pick up what is floating.

Did you ever think how like a human being that is? Ever one of us is both a receiving set and a broadcasting station. We are always receiving and giving out. Even the broadcasting station gives out only what it receives. We are constantly broadcasting our influence and constantly receiving influences broadcast by others. If we are always tuning in to receive evil, we must be broadcasting evil. If we receive good, we broadcast good.

It is true that "whatsoever a man sows, that shall he also reap," but in influence it is also true that whatever he receives that shall he also sow. No mind can continually expose itself to the reception of evil, without showing what it is filled with. It will display it in the language it uses, in the places it leads men, in the persons with whom he associates. It will even leave a stamp on the expression of his face. It leaves its impress on his home, on his children, on everything he comes in contact with. We cannot live without broadcasting our influence. It will be picked up often where we least expect it. It is carried down to the future generations. Perhaps some day we may be called upon to view the accumulation of that which we broadcasted as influence. Perhaps we may view it with humiliation and shame. On the other hand, we may send out that which we may see again as an accumulation of good that has been felt by thousands and even millions who have never heard of us, and who, in turn, have sent it on through the ages. We will surely be much happier to see an accumulation of good to our credit than a mountain of evil. Let us be careful as to what we broadcast.

Roadmaster Chris Longwell has a crew working on the road this week. Ed Grier was in Portland on business Tuesday.

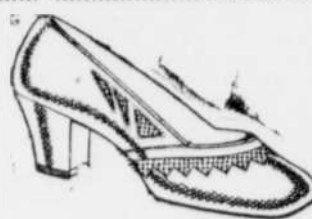
