WILD PITCH LOSES GAME TO HILLSBORO

ESTACADA PITCHER ALLOWS BUT FOUR HITS; SCORE IS 1-0 IN HARD CONTEST

Estacada baseball club in the Portland Valley league lost to Hillsboro Sunday in a contest which they, by all the rules of the game, should have won, hands down. But the old man jinx seems to still remain on the job, aided by umpires who do not seem to know there is any such thing as official rules.

Heitsman, Estacada twirler, let the Hillsboro gang down with four hits and with nine strikeouts to his credit, as against nine hits collected by the Estacada sluggers, and with only four strikeouts by the Hillsboro pitcher. Estacada had one error in the game against them, but it was made at a time when it did not hurt, the lone tally in the game being made in the ninth when a Hillsboro runner came home from second base on a wild pitch by Heitsman.

The team managers had agreed to allow one base on overthrows, and in this case Estacada contended that the runner was entitled to but one, and the umpire allowed the tally to stand, and a formal protest has been made.

The Lovelace brothers combination were each accredited with a pair of hits in the game; Tuma, Sherner, Harry Miller and Clow with one hit each accounted for the nine safe bingles made by Estacada.

Heitsman looked like a major league pitcher Sunday, and if he can live up to the reputation he made at Hillsboro, Estacada is in line to get into the win column Thursday, and again next Sunday.

Bert Fleskes, one of the best catchers in the league, has signed with Estacada and will replace Clow. Fleskes will don an Estacada uniform Thursday for the first time, when Washougal-Camas plays a postponed game here. Sunday afternoon the Oregon City crowd will be in Estacada, and it is likely that the fans will have an opportunity to bat against one of their old team mates, Malcom Riebhoff. Both games will start at 2:30.

In the other league games last Sunday, Oswego defeated Oregon City 12 to 0; Vancouver won over Sellwood 6 to 4; and Camas-Washougal won over Sellwood 13 to 0.

FIREWORKS DISPLAY TO BE RODEO FEATURE

OREGON CITY, May 28.—(Special).—One of the most elaborate displays of fireworks ever offered in Oregon will feature the Frontier Days round-up at Oregon City on the night of July 4. Approximately \$4,000 will be spent on the program and the Hitt Fireworks company will arrange the display after the night show, which will be the finale to the roundup.

The fireworks will feature the Spirit of the Trail and some of the pictures to be shown will be the covered wagon, pony express, Chief Multnomah, Indian bear hunt, American Legion emblem, American flag and a score or more of others.

Oregon City will be decorated in bright colors for the round-up and merchants have already signed contracts to have their stores decorated with banners and streamers. The American Legion, which is sponsoring the show, will have banners, streamers, pictures, flags and other decorations on Main street from Fifth to Fourteenth, east on Fourteenth to Washington and north on Washington to the roundup grounds.

The Fisk company will "dress up" the city. This concern decorated for the Pendleton roundup, Portland rose festival, state fair and roundups at Sumas, Shelton and Ellensburg, Washington.

FINED FOR NET FISHING IN CLACKAMAS RIVER

Oregon City, May 28.—The first arrests of the season for illegal fishing on the Clackamas were made Friday by Game Wardens Christensen and Hearing who took Lewis McLain of Gresham and Fred Ott of Molalla, in custody. The young men were caught fishing with two nets near the Barton bridge and one salmon was found in their possession.

The fishermen entered pleas of guilty before Justice Tatro and were fined \$160 each inclusive of court costs. The maximum penalty is a fine of \$500 and a jail sentence of six months.

This was the first venture on the river for the two men, wardens learned, as they had purchased the nets and a boat in Portland.

OREGON CITY CENSUS AREA HEADQUARTERS

DISTRICT WILL INCLUDE FOUR COUNTIES; LOCAL MAN TO BE SUPERVISOR

OREGON CITY, May 28.—This city has been designated as headquarters of a new census district, which has just been created under orders of Director Steuart of the United States census bureau.

The new district is composed of the counties of Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia and Washington, and has been detached from the larger district of which Salem is the headquarters.

An effort will now be made to secure the appointment of Fred S. Perrine, secretary of the Oregon City chamber of commerce, as district supervisor, and recommendations in his behalf have been forwarded to Washington. Under the rule of the census bureau, the supervisor must be a resident of the city named as headquarters.

Oregon City will be the center for all activities for taking the next census in the counties making up the district and all enumerators will work under the direction of the district supervisor.

The Oregon City chamber of commerce has been working on the position for the creation of a new district for some weeks, and was assisted by Senators Steiwer and McNary, who rendered major assistance on the ground with the bureau of the federal census.

Sandy Dances to Close at 12

Under the new law, taking effect June 3, all towns of under 500 population may not operate public dances after midnight. Some of the Sandy boys are reported as "seeing double" and trying to "figger out" if Sandy really hasn't its "500," but Uncle Sam's census man will be around this summer.

Mr. Orr Will Work for a Rest

POWER COMPANY TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

The Portland Electric Power company is undertaking quite an extensive program of building in the Three Links district, more generally known as Camp 8. Quite a large crew of extra men are now employed there, and it is said that at least seventy-five extra men will be used during the summer.

The work, except the preliminaries, will not get under way until the water is much lower than at present, it is said. The men employed now are clearing, repairing and rebuilding the road and bridges, in preparation for active development work when the water conditions are right in the Clackamas.

Sandy Real Estate Moves

George Beers completed the deal Saturday for the transfer of the 20-acre J. A. Hall farm, improved, to Adolph Amstad, Portland, who will soon occupy the place. Amstad bought 20 acres of the Hall farm last winter. The Grandma Krebs home, Sandy, is now the property of Hall, the deal just being closed. Halls will soon be Sandy residents.
