THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL PICNIC OF EAGLE CREEK GRANGE TO BE BIG AFFAIR

The 31st annual picnic of the Eagle Creek grange is scheduled to be held on Saturday, May 21. C. L. Chambers is in charge of the program for the day and he announced that the morning session will be known as "Farmers Institute" this year. Speakers on this program will be Mr. F. J. Becker of Gresham who will talk on the question "Raising Vegetables for Cold Packing." This is something new in agriculture and promises to be of great benefit to the farmers of this district. The object is to freeze peas, beans, etc. and sell them in packages. Another speaker will be Carroll D. Bush prominent nursery man of Eagle Creek who will deliver an interesting talk on the "New Fruits."

A feature of the morning program will be an "Agricultural" baseball game between the Springfield and the Eagle Creek granges. In agricultural baseball the pitcher throws the questions at the catcher, most of the questions being of a highly amusing character. It's a lot of fun and should add greatly to the success of the picnic.

Basket lunch will be enjoyed at 12:30 and coffee will be served. In the afternoon the various schools of this district will compete in athletic events, dancing and singing for which a trophy will be awarded the winning school.

The principal address of the day will be on the subject "World Conditions" and the speaker will probably be G. Bernard Noble of Reed College. Following the main address there will be miscellaneous attractions.

In the evening the Eagle Creek grange will stage their annual picnic dance at Fuch's hall.

Notes From County Agent

Plantings of red creeping fescue grass seed for seed production purposes have been made by three Clackamas county farmers. According to county agent J. J. Inskeep these are believed to be the first commercial plantings of red creeping fescue in Clackamas county.

Red creeping fescue is an excellent pasture grass and because of its fine green blades in resistance to drought it shows great promise of becoming a fine lawn grass. The seed planted came from an actual planting on the farm of Henry Schmidt of Garfield, and was found by county agent Inskeep and Henry Rampton of the Oregon experiment station in 1936.

Mr. Schmidt carefully fertilized and cared for the plot in 1937 and stripped a quantity of seed which was planted by V. C. Doppie of Liberal, Charles Gerber of Clarks, and Ray Reitsma of Boring. So rare is the seed that it has been planted in rows where it will be cultivated the first summer to keep the strain pure from weeds and other grasses.

No creeping fescue seed is now grown in the U. S. and it is obtainable only in small lots from England. Vernon Hepler of Canby also has a small lot of seed grown on the grass nursery established on his farm in 1936. The seed for his plot was obtained from the Oregon experiment station.

Rose city recorder, made a trip to Portland Wednesday to find out just how much reduction there would be in insurance rates in Estacada if the \$3500 bond issue is voted by Estacada people on May 20 and a new fire truck bought with the money. Mr. Rose was told that a new fire truck would make at least a reduction of 2.2 percent in insurance rates and undoubtedly much more than this figure. The 2.2 figure or least possible reduction would mean a saving of more than the extra taxes would be to pay up the \$3500 bond issue.
