Notes From

Plantings of red creeping fescue grass seed for seed production pur-poses have been made by three Clack-amas county farmers. According to county agent J. J. Inskeep these are believed to be the first commercial plantings of red creeping fescue in Clackamas county.

Red creeping lesculent pasture grass and because of its fine green blades in resistance to drought it shows great promise of becoming a fine lawn grass. The seed planted came from an actual planting on the farm of Henry Schmidt of Garfield, and was found by county agent Inskeep and Henry Rampton the Oregon experiment station in 1936

Mr. Schmidt carefully fertilized and cared for the plot in 1937 and stripped a quantity of seed which was planted by V. C. Doppleh of Li-beral, Charles Gerber of Clarkes, and Ray Reitsma of Boring. So rare is the seed that it has been planted in rows where it will be cultivated the first summer to keep the strain pur-

No creeping fescue seed is now
grown in the U. S. and it is obtainable only in small lots from England. Vernon Hepler of Canby also has

a small lot of seed grown on the gras-nursery established on his farm in 1936. The seed for his plot was ob-tained from the Oregon experiment
