E. P. line; thence South along the Easterly side of the P. E. P. R. R. to the Northwest corner of the Squaw Mountain Timber Co. Tr. in Section 20; thence East to the Northeast corner of the Squaw Mountain Timber Tr., thence southerly on the East boundary of the Squaw Mountain Timber Tr., to the N. W. corner of the J. J. Marchbank Tr.; thence Easterly along said street to its intersection with M. R. No. 19; thence Easterly along the N. side of M. R. No. 19 to its intersection of M. R. No. 2; thence Easterly along M. R. No. 2 to the West end of the Coupland Road in Sec. 22, T. 3 S., R. 4 E.; thence Easterly along the Coupland Road to the S. W. corner of the Katherine M. state house. When Governor Martin assumed office in 1935 the bonded indebtedness of the state was \$54,626,610.00 which has been cut to \$43,664,760.00 as of April 1, 1938, a reduction of \$10,961,850.00 in the two years, this despite the fact that the old capitol building burned down and a new one has been erected. Real and personal property taxes in 1936 amounted to 2.86 mills which has been entirely eliminated during the past two years. The governor is unalterably opposed to any further issuance of bonds and says if his program is carried on the state will be entirely free from debt by 1960. He condemns those who would chisel on the money belonging to the aged.

Asked to make a statement for the press the Governor obliged with the following information. We quote in part:
 "When I assumed office in 1935 the bonded indebtedness of the state of Oregon totaled \$54,625,610. The bonded debt as of April, 1938 was \$43,664,760.
 "When I was inaugurated Governor I inherited a deficit of \$1,304,290. This has been converted into a surplus of approximately \$500,000. This is the first time the state has not had a deficit since 1925.
 "The tax levy on real and personal property for state purposes in 1936 was 2.86 mills. In 1937 it was reduced to 1.15 mills. In 1938 all real and personal property tax for state purposes was eliminated.
 "This record has been achieved in addition to unforeseen demands resulting from the destruction of the historic old capitol building in 1935 by fire, which, of course, necessitated expenditure of funds for a new building. As a matter of fact two new

buildings the capitol and a new office library building.
 "This reduction has also been accomplished despite the reduction of the age limit for old age assistance from 70 to 65 years. This reduction of age was made effective January 1, 1938 by the legislature as a result of the program prepared under my direction by the state relief committee and the budget division.
 "Along with this reduction I have also effected complete restoration of salaries to state employees to the level prior to the depression, effective March 1, 1937.
 "I take great pleasure and satisfaction in this achievement because the principal platform in my race for election in 1934 was:
 "Tax reduction thru administrative reforms and retirement of the Oregon bonded debt load."
 "This achievement has been made possible by operation of the budgetary control act providing for continuous supervision of state activities resulting in greater efficiency, substantial savings and greater returns for money expended. This act was part of my initial legislative program.
 "Economical and efficient government is a fetish of mine, and I propose to continue it as long as I am Governor. I have found that it is best to effect economies and increase service to the public thru increased efficiency.
 "I am opposed to any future bond issues at this time. Under the present program Oregon will be free from bonded debt by 1960 providing there are no more issues.
 "Our state is in a sound financial condition, which means the people of

Oregon can use their money for constructive purposes including fuller abundantly endowed this state. The development of the varied and rich resources with which nature has so generously provided for the future is not heavily mortgaged for things used or consumed in the past."
 Taxpayers and aged people of the state will also be interested in just how Governor Martin stands relatively to old people getting their desired pensions. In a speech at Eugene Wednesday night the Governor said in part:
 "Old age pensions is no longer a political issue as the principal has been approved by the people and is being put into effect to the best of the state's ability. Let us turn to the record along this line that Oregon has made. Since August 1932 this state has spent \$44,322,000 for direct assistance to the needy and aged.
 Conservation of our pension funds is of vital importance. I do not propose to have the share of those in need consumed by chiselers and grafters who exert every effort to get on the assistance rolls and then stay there. I have incurred the hate of this class and can count on their opposing me under all circumstances. I refuse to truckle to them or buy their silence by condoning to their crookedness.
 "Such has been said recently about the so-called pauper's oath for old age assistance... the provision which provides for transfer of property of old age assistance beneficiaries to the county. This law was passed by the legislature in 1933 before I came into office. It is required by the federal government, elimination of which would mean withdrawal of federal assistance, which would mean 50% reduction of benefits to the aged."
