OSC Co-eds Start Home Practice

Seventeen senior women have entered the three home management houses at Corvallis where they will live for the next six weeks, carrying out all normal household duties, including the care of a young baby. These houses each with a baby of its own loaned by Oregon child care institutions provide a means for home economics seniors to apply the information gained in their college courses under some supervision.

Three Circulars Issued on Horticultural Work

Three brief mimeographed and printed circulars in the field of horticulture have just been issued at Oregon state college for free distribution. Circular of information No. 228 which is a revision of a former publication lists the insect pests of holly and makes control suggestions. It was prepared by Joe Shuh assistant and, and Don C. Mote, entomologist at the experiment station.

A brief printed folder extension bulletin No. 498 gives directions for the control of mosses and lichens on fruit and nut trees. Bordeaux mixture is recommended for this purpose. Extension circular 356 by O. T. McWhorter extension horticulturist, contains suggestions for training boysenberries and youngberries and includes drawings of two systems.
