Important 4-H Radio Broadcast

4-H club members of Clackamas county will have opportunity to hear two radio talks of importance to the club program Monday evening, February 3, on the regular club period on KOAC starting at 7:30 o'clock announcing Edwin Keltner, county club agent.

"Fitting 4-H Club Work to the Needs of the State" will be discussed by W. L. Teutsch assistant director of extension. He will tell of several new developments in club work related to present conditions and show how the club programs may assist in the general improvement of agricultural and home conditions in Oregon.

Dr. J. N. Shaw head of the Oregon state college veterinary department will speak on "Lamb Diseases" following Mr. Teutsch's talk. Dr. Shaw has done a great deal of work recently in solving some of the most baffling diseases sheepmen have to contend with. His discussion now, at the start of lambing will be of exceptional value to every sheep club member and leader, says Mr. Keltner.

All Huntley could do was drive the machine off the highway and watch it burn, this being about half a mile below Brightwood.

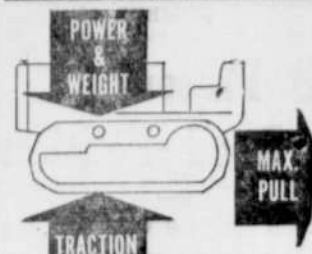
Scholarly Intruder
