Argentina to Send U. S. 300,000 Boxes of Pears

A limitation of 300,000 boxes of pears shipped to the United States from Argentina has been arranged for the current season according to word received at Oregon state college from the Federal Marketing service. Last season about 265,000 boxes of pears were shipped to this country and Oregon growers have been conducting a campaign to cut off or curtail such shipments this season.

The normal shipping season for Argentine pears of the Bartlett variety ends about April 1. The announcement just received states that the 300,000 box limitation is for the period between now and that date. Some late varieties are available for shipment after April 1 but reports indicate that the crop of late pears is relatively short.

The action just taken by the Argentine government is expected to help stabilize the pear market in the United States during the next few months and will therefore be of benefit to the pear growers of both countries according to the Federal marketing service.
