Work for Dairy Improvement

The first annual meeting of the Clackamas county dairy herd improvement association was held last week in Oregon City. The 1940 officers were reelected by unanimous vote to head the association for the current year. Officers are, president, John Kunzman, Maple Lane; vice president, Jack Gribble, Canby; secretary-treasurer, Vernon Hepler, Canby; and directors, J. A. Coulter, Beavercreek and Walter Staehli, of Central Point.

The association, although not in operation quite a year has 31 signed members with 617 cows being tested for butterfat and milk production.

Farmers have long felt the need of an association of this type to give them an opportunity of culling out the border or poor producers in their herds. It is already felt by members of the association that benefits derived have been very encouraging and will make for a better dairy enterprise in Clackamas county.

The new commercial schedule follows:

First 150 kilowatt hours 3.3c a kilowatt hour; next 350 kilowatt hours 2.4c a kilowatt hour; next 1000 kilowatt hours 1.2c a kilowatt hour; next 13,000 kilowatt hours 0.96c a kilowatt hour; next 25,000 kilowatt hours 0.48c a kilowatt hour; excess above 100,000 kilowatt hours 0.36c a kilowatt hour.

No demand charge for the first 10 kilowatts of demand per month; demand charge of \$1.14 per kilowatt of demand in excess of 110 kilowatts of demand per month. The energy charge for use in excess of 360 times the demand shall be subject to a reduction of 0.6 mills per kilowatt hour from the otherwise applicable rate.

New Rate to Mean Saving

Commercial users of electricity in territory of the Portland General Electric company will save approximately \$485,000 annually, based on their 1940 use of current as the result of the new Bonneville-type rate schedule filed by the company with Ormond R. Bean state utilities commissioner late last week. The new schedule will become effective with all meter readings taken after March 25th.

Company officials explained that the new schedule is in effect the Bonneville standard rate for commercial establishments as recommended by Bonneville administrator Jaul J. Raver for public utility districts and municipalities distributing power from the federal project with an added temporary surcharge similar to those found in the rate schedules of McMinnville, Monmouth, Cascade Locks, Skamania PUD and other public bodies which are purchasing their power requirements from Bonneville.

PGE it was announced has adopted the Bonneville standard rate as its objective and intends to adjust the present temporary surcharge which is roughly equivalent to the company's taxes in the light of any future increases in consumption of electricity or other circumstances which result in operation economies that can be passed on to the public.

An important feature of the new rate is elimination of demand charges for commercial users of electricity whose demand is 10 kilowatts or less, a classification in which 91 percent of PGE's commercial customers fall. Demand measurement will be made by suitable meters and in any one month will be the customer's greatest average demand over a period of 30 minutes.
