FACTS

The Taxpayers of Clackamas County Should Know

Clackamas county's school census population decreased during 1940 by 208 this including children between the ages of 4 and 19 inclusive, it was disclosed last week by superintendent E. A. Woodworth who made revisions and corrections in the reports of district census takers. Clackamas county's total of 14,717 includes 7552 boys and 7165 girls as against the 1939 total of 14,925, 7659 boys and 7266 girls. It is upon a basis of this census that county school funds will

be distributed in 1941 Woodworth pointed out.

Clackamas county received a total of \$117,071,996 as its share of revenues received by the state during the year 1940 from motor vehicle taxes it was disclosed today by county treasurer W. W. Everhart who received a check for \$20,108.96 as final payment of the county share. In 1939 this county received \$108,737.64.

Payments received from the motor vehicle revenues for 1940 were divided as follows: July \$58,717.80; December \$39,145.20; and \$40,108.06 on January 20.

The state's total "take" during the year was \$15,356,441 of which \$11,301,492 came from gasoline taxes, \$2,900,537 from motor vehicle registration fees, \$1,124,120 from motor carrier fees and \$30,291 from fines for violation of motor vehicle laws.

County treasurer Everhart says a total of \$2,410,961 or 15.7 percent of the fund was allocated to the counties. As its last payment for 1939 Clackamas county received \$11,971 and anticipated an approximate sum this year but it was considerably boosted.

The Clackamas county law library fund which receives its financial aid from 10 percent of the filing fees, has accumulated \$200.95 so far in 1940 but \$367.75 was spent in that year on the library. A surplus of \$333.57 was left from 1939.

Oregon's visitors traveling by automobile will no longer be required to register their cars under the provisions of Senate Bill No. 4 which has passed the house without a dissenting vote.

This bill was the first thru the senate being unanimously approved and was also the first senate bill to receive the approval of the house. Prepared and introduced at the request of secretary of state Earl Snell, the bill bringing about this repeal places Oregon in line with the many states that are doing all in their power to eliminate barriers between the states and to promote the free and uninterrupted flow of traffic with the least possible inconvenience and delay to the traveling public.

Two of the regulations most generally misunderstood are the matter of turning right on the red light and pedestrian observance it was said. In Oregon the law forbids right turns on a red light except at intersections where specific instructions are given on a sign posted on the traffic signal standard. If this sign says right turns permitted at all times or if it carries the information that right turns are permitted when a green arrow shows such turns may be made but in all other cases no right turn may be made legally while the traffic light is red. The confusion on this point arises because some states permit right turns on red lights it is said.

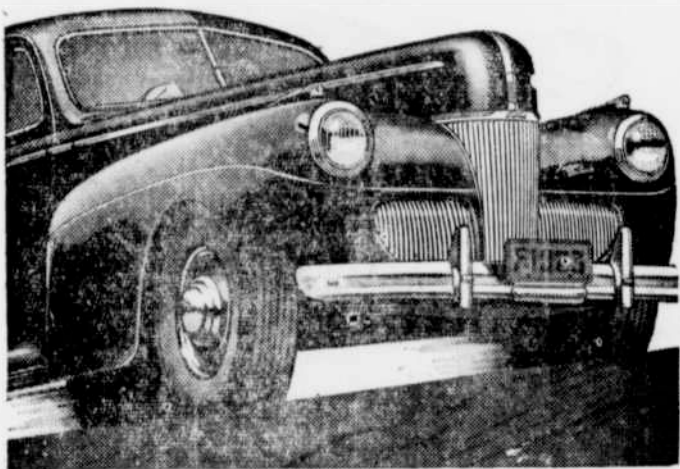
