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Will Discuss Ways and Means

HAIRY VETCH HARVESTING METHODS TO BE DISCUSSED AT COUNTY MEET

Ways and methods of harvesting hairy vetch seed so as to hold losses by shattering to a minimum will be discussed at a meeting to be held at 1:30 Wednesday afternoon, March 12th in the Oregon City chamber of commerce rooms according to county agent J. J. Inskeep.

E. R. Jackman, crop specialist at Oregon state college who has made a study of the vetch harvesting problems will be present and assist in conducting the meeting.

All Clackamas county growers of this important seed crop are invited to attend this meeting and to give the others present the advantage of their experience which may enable Clackamas county farmers to increase their income during the 1941 season.

Although slugs destroyed a portion of the acreage in Clackamas county a large acreage of hairy vetch yet remains and prospects for a good price are excellent.

In former years many growers have lost over half their crop of hairy vetch seed because it shatters readily in the field.

The planting of smelt in the Clackamas would be of practical benefit to a large per cent of the population of this area and of the state of Oregon generally.

Johnston Heads Committee

Supt. Melvin F. Johnston of the Estacada public schools is chairman of the committee on appraisal of the conference for the annual state conference of city school superintendents to be held in Salem on Friday and Saturday, March 14 and 15 under the joint auspices of the Oregon state teachers association and Rex Putnam superintendent of public instruction.

Wilbur D. Rowe superintendent of the Milwaukie public schools as president of the department of superintendence of the Oregon state teachers association will preside at the conference. Supt. A. C. Hampton of Astoria is vice president and Supt. W. M. Campbell of Roseburg is secretary. Other members of the executive committee are Supt. E. H. Hedrick of Medford, retiring president; Supt. A. E. Hirschler (Baker); Rex Putnam supt. of public instruction and D. A. Emerson, state department of education.

Important committee reports will be given on the following subjects: Legislation; custodial administration and training; high school activities; vocational education; teacher education and training for elementary schools; use of publications of the state department of education; handbooks for school officers; criteria for evaluating elementary schools; and coordination of health activities.

The opening address of the conference will be given by Gov. Charles A. Sprague and will be followed by an address by Rex Putnam superintendent of public instruction and by committee reports and discussions. The annual banquet of the association will be held Friday evening.

All of the general meetings of the conference will be held in the Hearing Room of the state capitol. It is anticipated that approximately 150 superintendents and principals will be in attendance.

Kelly Asks For Home Guard

CRITICIZING GOV. SPRAGUE FOR NOT FORMING HOME GUARD AT ONCE IN THIS STATE

"Governor Sprague apparently does not realize the urgent need for the formation of a home guard in Oregon at once," declared Alfred Kelly, state commander of the American Legion in his address before the Americanization meeting held last Friday evening in the auditorium of the Estacada union high school.

Declaring that the Governor, while a good man and a fine governor had shown himself to be negligent of his duty in not exercising his authority to call for the formation of a home guard in Oregon immediately, Commander Kelly said:

"You don't wait to organize a fire department until a fire breaks out. Neither should we here in Oregon wait for an emergency to form a state home guard."

Kelly said that home guards had been organized in 35 states of the union and that it was particularly important that a guard be formed in Oregon since the entire west coast of the United States is practically defenceless.

"Men should be selected for guard service at once," said Kelly, "given a physical examination and set to work studying problems which will arise in case we are attacked."

Kelly declared that Americans were too much given to seeking physical comforts of life and should give more attention to spiritual growth and moral building. "A nation that is spiritually powerful and physically armed is unbeatable," he said.

"If we are going to maintain our civilization," he continued, "and hand it down to posterity we must dedicate ourselves to God and country."

In spite of the inclement weather and numerous other attractions on the same night the meeting drew a large crowd and was declared to have been highly successful.

Lloyd H. Ewalt served as master of ceremonies and Commander Kelly was introduced by S. E. Lawrence, commander of Carl Douglas American Legion post of Estacada.

Prior to Commander Kelly's address the program consisted of several selections by the high school band a tableau of Red Cross mothers, songs by the Odd Fellows quartet and other features. "God Bless America" was sung by all in closing, led by W. M. Wade.

The program was put on under auspices of the Odd Fellow grand lodge of Oregon and was under the direct supervision of the Estacada lodge with Fremont Hayden as general chairman.

The purchase of the 20 acre tract by Mrs. Lillian Hansen from owners of the property living in California is expected to be consummated this week.

The new garbage dump will be the fourth in the county the others being at Oregon City, Canby and Rosemont. Tentative plans include the construction of an incinerator with drying grates and an electric blower to make the new plant compare with Rosemont the only one of the three now having this equipment. Mrs. Hansen plans to operate one truck at the beginning. This will pick up an estimated one to two tons of garbage daily in territory covering Sandy, Estacada and Gresham.
