It is no secret that Britian expects that revolts in the conquered states will eventually be a major factor contributing to Hitler"s collapse. The fact that the United States has actually intervened in the war, even though only as a non-belligerent is expected to give new hope to millions of people who now live as virtual prisoners of the nazi-fascist system.

It is significant that the President had little to say concerning the world after the war. The whole emphasis, here and in England, is now being placed upon victory. That dominates all official thinking and planning. There is little time for discussion about the world order of the future.


