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Power Network is Started

N. E. CLACKAMAS ELECTRIC CO-OP., INC., NEW POWER LINE IS NOW UNDER WAY

Construction of the new 56-mile distribution network of the Northeast Clackamas Electric Co-op., Inc. started on Monday of this week. Huenergard & Wayman of Portland the contractors are starting the work on the lines in the Sandy Heights district.

Electrical contractors in the Estacada, Sandy and Dover districts have so started work on house wiring for the initial block of 45 houses to be served by the new power system. About 180 rural residences are slated for wiring in the REA financed project according to WP Colley project coordinator.

Local people who have been working so hard to bring electricity to their farm homes are now seeing their dream at last come true.

Much of the credit for the success of the enterprise is justly due Clay A. Chaney of George who was one of the promoters of the project.

Trout Fishing Season Opens

TROUT FISHING SEASON OPENS THIS SATURDAY, APRIL 12; REGULATIONS NOTED

Come what may, rain, snow or hail, the rod and reel boys of Oregon will be on the open waters of the state next Saturday, April 12 for the opening of the general trout fishing season.

There are some who must delay the delight of that first day or fishing until May 3 for the open season in some of the counties in high altitudes has been delayed for two weeks. These counties include Baker, Union, Umatilla, Grant, Malheur, Wallowa, Harney, Lake, Gilliam, Wheeler and Morrow counties. However the season in these counties will not close until November 1 while the general season in other counties of the state closes on October 15.

The general bag limit for game fish over six inches and both steelhead trout and salmon when less than 15 inches in length is 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 40 fish in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time. Variations from this general bag limit have been set in certain lakes and anglers are asked to refer to the 1941 fishing synopsis for this information as well as other special regulations. Copies of the new regulations may be obtained from all license agents and sporting goods stores.

Only two changes in license fees were made by the state legislature. One provides the special vacation license fees for both residents and non-residents at \$3 for ten days effective after July 1, 1941. Up to that time a special two day vacation license for \$2 may be procured. The other change came in license fees for persons over 65 years of age who have resided in Oregon for ten years or more. Such persons may obtain a special fishing and hunting license for 50 cents providing that each applicant first make affidavit that he or she is unable to pay the regular \$5 fee. These special licenses will be available after the law becomes effective on June 14.

An important change in regulations affects use of live minnows in water of Oregon. Live minnows may not be used in angling for any game fish in any waters except only in those streams and lakes known to contain spiny-rayed fish and then only when the minnows are used as bait in the same waters from which they have been taken.

Steelhead are classed as trout in the Rogue river and all its tributaries and all laws regarding trout are there applicable to steelhead. Open season for trout six inches or over in the Rogue river and its tributaries is April 12 to December 31 both dates inclusive except that in tributaries of the Rogue river above Gold Hill the open season is from April 12 to November 30 both dates inclusive.

Open season for spiny-rayed fish is the entire year except for Oswego lake in Clackamas county where the season extends from April 12 to October 31; Dunaway pond in Malheur county January 1 to April 30 both dates inclusive and November 1 to December 1 both dates inclusive; and Lake of the Woods in Klamath county where the season will be from April 12 to November 30 both dates inclusive.

All fishermen are required to obtain catch report cards to be filled out and sent to the game commission after each fishing trip. Cards are postpaid and require no signature. Data contained on these cards will be used to augment findings of survey crews operating in various parts of the state and will aid in providing better fishing in Oregon. Cards may be obtained from all license agents and from sporting goods houses as well as from the Portland office of the commission.

Berries Will Be Early

STRAWBERRIES NOW BLOOMING; LOGANS WILL BE READY EARLY IN JUNE

With berries farther advanced than they have been in many a spring, indications point to the annual loganberry harvest here being the first part of June. Ordinarily logans are not picked until the middle or last part of June.

Strawberries are now blooming and will be unusually early.

Present indications point to a bumper crop of both strawberries and logans. Fear is expressed however, that there is going to a great shortage of pickers. This is specially true as regards to strawberries as they may be ready for picking before the schools are out in May. Since local growers have to depend in a great degree on getting help from school students this may be a serious problem.

No set price for strawberries of logans or wages for pickers has yet been determined.

Broadcasting Station in Estacada

Broadcasting is not new to Mr. Weeman who operated a similar station at Cascade Locks and sent and received messages over most of the world. Mr. Weeman explained that now however, owing to the war radio stations are permitted to talk with certain countries.

Ranger Weeman has a large book filled with hundreds of cards from far parts of the world acknowledging receipt of his broadcasts.

In the case of emergency Mr. Weeman's broadcasting station may be used for government business such as forest fires in the national forest, etc.
