**Water Found Ample for 55 PerCent of Irrigated Lands**

Approximately 55 percent of the irrigated lands of southern and eastern and southern Oregon for which water forecasts are made will have ample water for irrigation this season according to a summary made by R. A. Work, Medford, in charge of snow surveys and irrigation water forecasts for the soil conservation service and the Oregon agricultural experiment station.

About 45 percent of the irrigated lands will experience various degrees of shortage this year with some 23 percent expected to have a mild shortage which will permit the maturing

of most crops. On about 17 percent of the irrigated area of the state however the shortage is expected to become critical.

These percentage figures are based on records of irrigated lands by districts in the state engineers office and are not issued as being accurate as to detail. They do indicate however the general conditions of water supplies in the state in relation to total volume of irrigated says Work. The figures do not include the irrigated areas of the Willamette valley or the coast region.

In general the regions with ample irrigation water supplies are south and east of a line drawn from Upper Kamath Lake to the western border of Wallowa county.

**State Typing Contest is April 19**

The usual keen interest is being shown in the nineteenth annual state typing contest and the tenth annual shorthand contest to be held at Corvallis April 19 under the auspices of the secretarial science department says H. T. Vance head of the department. Valuable prizes donated by type writer companies will be awarded in addition to banners and cups for winners in the various classes.

**Mattress Making Applications IN State Pass 10,000**

Surplus raw cotton from the southern states will roll into Oregon thru out this spring and summer to meet the needs of the mattress making centers thruout the state where thousands of Oregon families have applied for the privilege of making their own mattresses from the surplus cotton being distributed free thru the AAA and surplus marketing administration.

Officials of the OSC extension service in charge of the mattress making project report a far greater response in many counties than was anticipated when the project was undertaken. Already applications in 25 counties have been made for 10,078 mattresses which will require some 15 carloads of raw cotton. The project may be extended later to other counties.

\*Altho applications are accepted only from families with a stated minimum annual cash income the extension service emphasizes the fact that this is not a relief project but instead is a means of disposing of huge stocks of surplus cotton while at the same time increasing the standard of living in rural homes.

With application by the first week in March, Marion county led the others in the response to the program. Malheur county where the actual mattress making work was started first has application for 1249 mattresses of which 480 have been made. In Deschutes county the program is under way with 509 applications and approximately 300 mattresses made. Klamath county is also started with 329 applications and about 100 made so far. Both Jackson and Josephine county families have turned in an excess of 700 applications.

The Oregon granges are cooperating in the program by making the grange halls available as centers for making the mattresses. Certain special machinery is supplied to each center and in each case local instructors are trained by the extension service to help in the actual making of the mattresses. Those who have completed their mattresses so far are enthusiastic about the high quality of the product according to the extension leaders. Experience in other states states has shown that these mattresses will remain in excellent condition for years if given proper care.

**Red Soils: Area To Hold 'Open House' on May 22**

An "open house" field day at the Red Soils experimental area here in Clackamas county has been arranged for May 22 according to announcement made by J. J. Inskeep county agent. Tom DeArmond superintendent of the area for the Oregon agricultural experiment station will be prepared all day to show visitors over the station. Individuals and groups will be welcome any time during the day as there will be no single tours made.

The red soils experimental area was established by the legislature two years ago to study methods of rehabilitating the depleted red hill soils of western Oregon. Considerable progress has already been made says Inskeep.
