### DRIVER'S LICENSE IS **BOOSTED TO \$1.59**

Word has been received here this week from the office of Secretary of State Earl Snell that when Oregon's 490,000 drivers renew their driver licenses for the 1941-1943 license periiod they will pay \$1.50 instead of the \$1.00 charge of the past. Cur rent licenses June 30 with the new permits being required on the first day of July.

Under the act passed by this years legislature a "motor vehicle accident' fund is established in Oregon, Along with the one dollar fee for each driv. er's license the secretary of state is now required by the new law to col lect an additional 50 cents which goes into this fund which will be used to pay hospitalization expenses for in digents injured in automobile accidents..

There has been no change in the examination requirements for drivers licenses this year and drivers holding current licenses may renew them without submitting to any examination this year. Those not licensed during the current period 1939 to 1941 will be required to take the law examination the eye test and the drive test. Persons over 70 years of age regardless of whether they hold current licenses or not also must take these tests. Renewal application forms will be available about May 1 while the 1941-1943 drivers will not be valid until June 15.

#### Crop Report Shows Big Wheat Surplus Looming

Latest crop reports on the condition of winter wheat in America emphasizes the necessity of a vote on wheat marketing quotas according to Will Steen chairman of the Oregon AAA committee.

The April crop report indicates that spring and winter wheat production plus the present carry-over will add up to nearly 1 1/4 billion bush-This is about twice as much els. wheat as America normally consumes in two years. Other great wheat producing countries also report big surplusses of unsold wheat making the export outlook dark even without considering the war conditions which have cut off practically all chance of shipping wheat to countries whic

### could use it.

The final proclamation of marketng quotas must be made prior to May 15 and will probably follow the May crop report. Already the tentative date for such a referendum if called for has been set for May 31 If the quotas are prooclaimed and approved by growers, all farmers can sell all the wheat grown on their AAA acreage allotments. In other words, AAA cooperators will have nothing to worry about under the wheat quota system.

Farmers who have overplanted allotments will have to store the excess tices of deferred grazing ranchers in or pay a penalty on it.. Marketing the 1939 AAA range program reseed. quotas are a guarantee that all wheat ed more than 25 million acres of growers will share in taking care of rangeland.

" the surplus says chairman Steen. National figures show that wheat growers are cooperating well with the wheat adjustment program. The indicated acreage this year will be somewhat less than 63 1/2 million acres which is remarkably close to the acreage allotment of 62 million acres. The heavy prospective surplus has been brot about by the stoppage of practically all exports following several favorable production years.
