Soil Saving Practices Get Results at Newberg

Soil conservation practices tried out in cooperation with local land owners in the Newberg region in the last few years are showing more value from year to year reports H. N. Magnus of the soil conservation service. Not all of the practices experimented with are of equal value he said, but some have proved both practical and economical.

On the former Whittaker walnut orchard at the top of Rex hill where erosion had become serious diversion of drainage water and contour cultivation plus heavy seedings of inter cover and the use of straw mulch on steeper areas have combined to practically stop erosion and have increased the annual growth of the walnut trees. Frank Peters of the Chehalis mountain district reports that cultivation on the contour has not increased his work because though more turns are required the tractor works more efficiently because there is less shifting of gears.

Arrangements may be made with county agent Rex Warren or with officials of the SCS office for inspection tours of the farms where various methods have been used since 1936.

EMMA ISABELL KANDLE DIES; FUNERAL SET

Mrs. Emma Isabell Kandle, 85 life-long resident of Clackamas county died Thursday afternoon at her home in Beaver Creek. Born in Elwood on January 14, 1856 she had never resided outside the county.

She was the daughter of the late John and Diana Hughes Scott who came here by oxteam in 1853 and were the first settlers in Elwood, May 8, 1876 she was married to the late Matthias E. Kandle. They lived on a 110 acre farm which he had home-stended when a boy of 19. Mr. Kandle died in 1939.

Surviving are one son C.C. Kandle of Beaver Creek, a daughter Mrs. Alberta Laurence, Montana, a granddaughter Mrs. Arthur Redaway and two great grand children all of Oregon City.

Funeral services were held last Saturday at 2 p.m. at Oregon City, Interment took place at the Springwater cemetery.


