

## Blue Lake Park is Now Open

Beautiful Blue Lake park is now open and ready for a busy season. Manager Nick Welch and his corps of workers have been busy the past several months making extensive improvements on this popular play ground.

Blue Lake park is ideally located for this entire district being only 4 miles north of Gresham on the Fairview road. In going to the park the motorist turns north off Sandy blvd at Fairview where a large sign points the way to Blue Lake.

Blue Lake is undoubtedly one of the best equipped parks in the Pacific northwest. Located on beautiful Blue Lake a body of water which is ideal for boating and swimming, it offers not only wonderful water sport but also is equipped for popular recreations of other kinds. There are four soft ball diamonds. League baseball is played every Sunday at 2 p. m., next Sunday's game being between Blue Lake Park and the Marine Electric team of Portland.

The Eastern Multnomah softball association will hold their gala opening of the soft ball season on Friday evening, May 9th at Blue Lake park when a benefit dance will also be staged in the park pavilion.

The first league softball game will be played on Monday evening, May 12th.

### Space for 2000 Cars

No charge is made for parking at Blue Lake and there is room for 2000 cars. An admission charge of 15 cents is made for adults but children under 12 are admitted free.

The park is equipped with tables and benches capable of serving 5000 people. Picnickers will like the Dutch

ovens and the plentiful supply of dry wood. There are sand piles for the kiddies, horseshoe courts and a wonderful beach.

Swimming facilities at Blue Lake are the best in the state and supervised by qualified life guards. Dressing rooms are provided and you may either use your own suit or rent one on the grounds.

Commencing next Sunday May 4th there will be dancing every Sunday night in the large dancing pavilion at the park with music by the popular Clyde Brennan's 7-piece orchestra.

## Defense Bonds Now On Sale

The United States Defense Savings Bonds and Postal Savings stamps were placed on sale in the local postoffice at the opening of business on Thursday, May 1 as part of the national effort to make America impregnable.

Postmaster A. H. Fasel announced that Mayor S. E. Wooster had been the first citizen of this community to purchase a defense bond. It is expected that many other local citizens will follow Mayor Wooster's good example.

Postmaster General Frank C. Waller in a letter to postmasters throughout the country said that the help of local postmasters would be of real "service to the country." He transmitted the thanks of Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau for the help that local postmasters had already given in the sale of United States securities and also Mr. Morgenthau's thanks in advance "for the cooperation which he knows you will give to this new effort."

The new Defense Savings bond is similar to the familiar "baby bond" of which more than five billion dollars worth have been bought by more than two and a half million Americans since 1935.

A Defense Bond may now be purchased for the sum of \$18.75. In ten years this bond will be worth \$25. This is an increase of 33 1/3 percent equal to an annual interest return of 2.9 percent compounded semi-annually. Any time after sixty days from the date of purchase the bond may be redeemed for cash in accordance with a table of redemption values printed on the face of the bond.

To spread investments widely among all the people in America a limit of \$5000 has been set on the amount of these bonds to be bought by any one person in one year. The bonds are in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000 all of which are sold for 75 percent of their maturity value and all of which mature in ten years.

For larger investors who can afford to purchase up to \$50,000 worth of bonds a year the Treasury Department has issued two additional kinds of Defense Savings Bonds but these will be sold only thru banks and by direct mail from Washington, D. C. They are intended for associations, trustees and corporations as well as individual purchasers.

For the smaller investor who wants to buy a Government bond on the easy payment plan the post office will have a new series of Postal Savings stamps at 10c, 25c, 50c, \$1 and \$5. Each purchaser of any Savings Stamp higher than 10c will be given free of charge an attractive pocket album in which to paste his stamps until he has enough to buy a \$25 bond or one of higher denomination. Thirty million of these albums are now being prepared.

The cover design of the albums is in color featuring a United States battleship and an eagle bearing the American flag. On the back cover is a painting of the Minute Men statue by Daniel Chester French which symbolizes the American citizen ever alert in defense of his country. The inscription is "America on Guard."

Secretary Morgenthau said that even a boy or girl who saved 10c to buy a Savings Stamp would help the country. He added that "you can safeguard your own money and your own future were helping the national defense by buying United States Savings Bonds now."

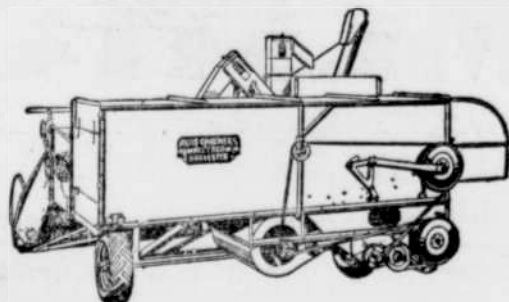


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
