CHAIRMAN S. T. POWELL CALLS MEETING AT CURRINSVILLE ON MATTRESS PROGRAM

Chairman S. T. Powell has called a meeting to organize the work on mattress making. This meeting is scheduled for this Friday, May 9th at 9:30 a.m. and will be held in the school house at Currinsville.

It is hoped that representatives will be present from the following districts: Estacada, Logan, Springwater, Dover, Eagle Creek, Garfield, George, Porter, Viola and Currinsville. Everyone interested in the project is urged to be present in order that work on the program may get off to a good start.

Mr. Powell said that 198 applications had been made for mattresses in the district. Fifty pounds of cotton is used in each mattress which means that 5 tons or 20 bales of cotton will be used to make mattresses in this territory.

Tax Payments More Prompt

Tax payments in Clackamas county thus far this year have been more prompt than last year Sheriff Fred Reakecker reported Saturday.

During the first four months of 1941 70.12 percent of the tax roll has been collected as compared with 67.65 for the same period in 1940 he stated.

Received this year was \$1,348,156.58 of which \$147,166.23 has been applied to delinquent taxes. Last year for the same four months \$1,454,145.27 had been collected, this larger sum being explained by the larger tax assessment of 1940.

Separate tax receipts this year number 29,175 thus far as compared with 27,850 for the four months last, past the sheriff pointed out.
