"Don't I know when I and Lige Coalman were packin' lumber on our backs from Carter rock to the summit for the first and only lookout cabin ever built on a perpetual snow peak," he asked.

Taking a long breath he continued: "That was in 1917 and while I was loadin' up with all I could carry on my back, here comes five Holly wood picture 'shooters.' They asked me to pose. I said I didn't care to be in it but they got a little above me and Lige and started grindin' and zip! I'd been 'shot' and with my long mustache droppin' with icicles, well! it happened before I could get my mitten up to wipe 'em off."

After the film had made the rounds of the cities, Otto Meinig who built the only movie house Sandy ever had showed the film here.

Maroney recalled that when the cabin was finished many easterners came to Mt. Hood not only to see the mountain but the tiny house on top of it.
