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## Forest Guards on Duty

### NEW DIRECTIONAL SIGNS TO BE ERECTED IN LOCAL DISTRICT OF MT. HOOD NAT. FOREST

Forest guards Suter, Pedersen, Oiser, Williams and government packer Warnock are beginning maintenance of forest service trails this week. In addition to the maintenance of the trails in this district which will take until the middle of July, some 150 informational and directional signs will be erected for the convenience of the traveling public. Mileages indicated on the new signs will be accurate as most of the trails were carefully measured last year. About 50 of the new signs are hand carved and were constructed by the CCC sign shop at Zigzag. Most of the signs are for erection in the Collawash watershed and vicinity.

Foreman Charles Kitching and Forest Guards Hale and Ruhl are beginning road maintenance this week. About 100 miles of forest roads will be maintained in this district prior to July 1st.

## Carload of Cotton Arrives

A carload of cotton and ticking has arrived in Clackamas county to be used in the cotton mattress program. Bales of cotton each weighing 500 pounds were delivered in six of the cotton mattress centers Saturday. Actual construction of the mattresses should begin within the next week or ten days at Canby at the fair grounds, Colton at the Luther league park, Estacada in the Currinsville school, in the Mulino community hall and the Elliott Prairie community hall and the Norris Young garage at Wilsonville.

Five other centers for the construction of mattresses will be established in June. The cotton mattress program is a cooperative project of the agricultural adjustment administration, surplus marketing corporation, extension service and the farm security administration. Thru the program surplus cotton is made available to low income families. Fifty pounds of cotton and 10 yards of ticking are available for each eligible family under the program.

Applications for these mattresses closed on April 1 at which time 804 applications for 1416 mattresses were received. Thru the activities of the home demonstration agents office teachers have been trained and the organization has been completed for the construction of these mattresses in the six communities. The community leaders and teachers are donating their services to this worth while program.

## LOCAL BOYS ACCUSED OF DISORDERLY CONDUCT

A number of local boys were brought into the justice court at Estacada on Monday night of this week on a charge of disorderly conduct. Judge C. O. Troupe presided and Frank Shelton who appeared as attorney for the boys filed a demurrer.

Sheriff Fred Reaksecker of Clackamas county and deputy district attorney Robert Mulvey were present and talked on law enforcement and order.

## Opening for More CCC Boys

Clackamas county has a quota of 23 CCC boys for the month of May and enrollments will be received at the Clackamas county welfare office in the courthouse at Oregon City on May 22 and 29.

Under the new law governing CCC enrollments boys who have been in the camp before can go back in 3 months instead of six months as formerly.

Any boy who is unmarried and a citizen of the United States and between the ages of 17 and 24 years may enlist in the CCC.

The boys are given a choice of training in more than 150 types of work and thus may be learning a vocation while earning. The boys are placed in the camp which handles the particular type of work in which they are interested.

Each boy receives \$30 a month \$15 of this amount being sent to dependents \$7 is placed on deposit and \$8 is given the boy for spending money.

The boys work 8 hours a day for 5 days a week except during an emergency.

Undoubtedly the CCC program is one of the most valuable ever instituted by the United States government. It builds a boy's self respect, his mind and his body so that he will be better equipped to seize the opportunities and to make his way in the world. All this is possible because his government striving to make him self-reliant and independent offers him employment with remuneration for the work he accomplishes in the conservation of the nation's natural resources.

## Farmer-Merchant Banquet Here

After a delicious banquet served by the home economics class upon tables beautifully decorated by the Estacada Garden club the meeting of the Farmers and Merchants held in the high school here Wednesday evening was called to order by J. A. Westcott of Boring.

The meeting began with a movie speech by R. M. Evans of the agricultural department. Mr. Evans declared that in view of the enormous surplus on hand and falling world markets the farmers should vote for the quota limit to stave off 35 cent wheat.

Following the movie a vocal and instrumental program was put on by the school faculty.

Mr. Enchede state member of the agricultural committee made the point that the merchants should give a hand before the farmers are sunk. Industries have been subsidized to the extent of 8 billion dollars by tariffs. The farm AAA has required about one billion to date. Mr. Donelson executive assistant AAA committee man, told the meeting the farmer and businessmen are getting closer in cooperation. One third of the farmers are not signed on the AAA quota limit but they produce what they want and ride on the prices set by the quota signed. Local farmers should cooperate with eastern Oregon on the quota limits Mr. Donelson said.

The following business men and farmers put on a panel discussion. Walter Buse, Oregon City; Fred Cochell, Milwaukie; Glen Cumberland, Sherwood; G. K. Gill, Redland; E. A. Koen, Oregon City; and G. F. Becker of Gresham on the subject of the future welfare of the farmer. Some speakers advised against over expanding on account of expected post war depression though this was disputed by one speaker who referred to world war No. 1. The following remarks were made: "The present war should be paid for by income taxes and not increased real taxes." "The farmer would pay an income tax with a smile, if he had one." "Inflation to be guarded against."

On the question of what change in agriculture can be made to enhance our national defense the following was offered: "Keep up farmer education as to diversifying crops, and soil improvement and let him have a little money too. Business curtail credit or installment sales, set up a labor court and penalize both sides until strikes are settled. The farmer is prepared for defense by the AAA program. Can expand or retract under it. Educate consumer public as to food values, fresh against highly processed products."

In summarizing the panel discussion J. J. Inskip said that in view of world conditions after the present crisis we might be compelled to change from production for profit to production for use.

It will certainly be difficult educating some of those old timers who have their brains grooved in the old way to see the necessity for the change.
